U.S. troops also provide a credibility signal for U.S. MNEs when they are stationed in host countries. Outside of combat situations, U.S. troops are stationed abroad to conduct regular training exercises with local military forces, staff bases, and engage in activities that include drug interdiction and peacekeeping efforts. Such hospitality can spill over into cooperation and stability for U.S. MNEs, prompting greater U.S. investor interest. The willingness of potential FDI host countries to accommodate an American troop presence, even if only on a temporary basis, may be an important signal to U.S. MNEs of a more positive political environment. In other words, the presence of U.S. troops indicates a political relationship between the host country and the U.S. government that reduces the chances of the host country interfering with U.S. investments.
