





Are Women Political Leaders Handling COVID-19 Better than Men?



Jacinda Arden was quick and firm in her preventive actions against COVID-19. Even when there were barely any cases in New Zealand Jacinda asked for citizens to self quarantine themselves and shortly after that she closed the international borders of New Zealand so that no stranger could come in and potentially contaminate New Zealenders. 
better than men? Well whatever you think one thing for sure, people should give women a chance in politics.
