- We will review the following data utilizing a specific format as facilitated by Tara Williams:
 - Updated Early Care Provider data from Survey
 - Survey data from Gorham Parents
 - Enrollment data (school)
 - K screening data (school)
 - Statewide and county data on child care, young children and families

Guiding questions:

1. **Was there specific data you found interesting or compelling, and, if so, why?**
 - Two Things: how people find out about child care- word of mouth. If you don't know someone, how do you find out? The number of 3rd graders that are where they are supposed to be (45% state wide) reading.
 - 66% of people didn't feel there was adequate care available in Gorham. Lack of availability and cost. If you can't afford \$300 per week, there isn't access.
 - Availability is we don't have enough providers.
 - Numbers of live births and then how many more families are moving in.
 - Wages that are earning - not livable. Today is not matching - child care dollars can't keep up.

- Didn't see data - or question - for families in childcare. Should we find out how many would like child care but can't access it or how many don't need or want it.
- Are you satisfied or happy with your current child care?
- Total number of opportunities (openings) vs. students coming through and how that matched up.
- Current data - a lot of programs aren't at capacity right now because they don't have workforce, or because they have pulled themselves back due to dealing with COVID.
- Most family child care is licensed for 12, but when you put a 2 or younger in the mix, you are automatically capped at 8. If there are staff, family child care providers can get 12.
- We have 43 5 year olds in Gorham that are in child care. Are people holding them back, would be interested in learning more about why?
- Didn't see any information about families that do non traditional child care - like a family friend watches them, or grammie. Might be worth asking.
- Didn't get Gorham Rec in this survey. Many children receiving before and after school care. Should be some valuable information there.

2. What data is missing? What additional information would help you better understand early childhood and school readiness in this community?

3. What do you notice about age, gender, language, or race/ethnicity in the data? Are there disparities we need to address to support children and families?

- Interesting to see how few we have on child care subsidy.
- How few non white children represented.
- State of Maine poverty rates (2018).
- Where can I find racial/ethnic disparities regarding access to child care?
- 45% of income of single parent - paid for child care.

4. What might be working to support young children? What might not?

- The percentage of cost for family and income of child care providers...how do you get unstuck?
- Location is very important to parents seeking child care.
- Volume is a factor. Then there is a question regarding quality. Three legs, how many students, what you are charging parents, what you are paying staff. Move any one part impacts the others. Max numbers are set by the state.
- There are a lot of great choices with experience here in Gorham.

- SEL & Academic Expectations for students entering K.
 - SEL tools and resources used in K: mindfulness, restorative circles, Second Steps, code of conduct
 - Typical K Day - arrive, outdoor morning recess or indoor activities, circle time (calendar, weather, days of schools, morning message), snack time, Being a Reader program, center time, Reveal Math program, Lunch and Recess, Specials/Allied Arts, Being a Writer, Social Studies and Science
 - Listens and follows directions, works well in groups, solves problems appropriately, stays on task and uses time efficiently, follows school and classroom rules, uses grade level organizations skills, completes school work, and more
- Overview of SEL & Academic targets for students at end of K
 - Learn alphabet and basic features of letters and words, break down spoken and written words into syllables and letters and identify sounds, learn to read, and more
 - Count to 100, Read and write numbers up to 30, compare and order numbers up to 20, identify 2D and 3D shapes, create and describe patterns, solve addition and subtraction problems to 10, know days of the week and the purpose of the calendar
 - Science & social studies: life cycle of butterflies, plants and seeds, weather/seasons, community workers, building classroom community

Note from large group discussion

- Ted talk about architecture and how it effects the learning environment- provoke us to think about things in new ways
- “You are waterproof, you won’t melt in the rain. Children are meant to be outside!”
- Concerned that her engagement was looking at it from birth up- a lot of the conversation is about public PreK- bias toward play- it is important to meet them at developmental level- there is time for freedom- play is a time for social/emotional growth- there has to be intention from adult so the adult can encourage children so their development is progressing
- Play is hierarchical, stages of play, it is multifaceted- we need to nurture the foundation so children can grow when they get to school
- There was a nice balance of understanding the progression of play- teacher creates meaningful playful activities and observes

CDS (Child Development Services)

- Birth to age 5/Kindergarten
- 9 regional offices, CDS REACH in Portland serves Gorham
- Early Intervention (Part C), infants and toddlers
 - Referrals: parents, child care program, home visiting, pediatricians, DHHS
 - Usually a developmental concern
 - May lead to comprehensive evaluation which determine if child qualifies for services, there are some automatic qualifications for services, can use their own expertise at CDS to support qualification
 - Coaching model with parents, families, and child care staff; planning together, embed strategies in everyday routines
 - Who works in CDS part C: early childhood special educators, occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech and language
- Transition to Part B, the Part C staff helps start the process about 6 months ahead, child has to be re-evaluated if evaluation took place more than 6 months before 3 years before
- CDS Special Education (Part B), 3-5 years old
 - Referrals come from Part C, parents, child care programs, preschools, pediatricians
 - Services have to be provided in an educational setting (child care, preschool) and run on a school-year calendar
 - Workforce shortages in this part of CDS affecting waitlists, not all children getting timely services
 - Services: Speech, Occupational therapist, Physical therapist
 - Longest waitlist right now is for those children who qualify for a developmental preschool
- Public School Special Education (Part B), 5-21 years old
 - Special Education strategists in public schools start getting information in December about children coming from CDS to Kindergarten next school year
 - Gorham School District starts outreach in January with families, then can observe children in their setting
 - Most important aspects of a strong transition, building relationships
 - Gorham has several children coming from Developmental special purpose preschools

Overall Concern: this isn't about the Gorham school system. This is about babies and young children. I want to make sure that this doesn't sound like it's from the school system. They are a leader in bringing this together, but we need some engagement and ownership in this. We want the partnership to form. There are some places that do read a little heavy on "school system."

Vision and Mission language: when I see the "healthy development and school readiness" worries me → as a parent, I really like the "nurturing care and healthy development"

Pg. #4: Arrows pointing make you read it in a way that follows the arrow.

- Arrow is interesting in that it catches the eye ... but needs to be reformatted.
- Maybe different colors?

Pg. #5: "Failure to ..." → is this too negative?

- It's realistic, not necessarily a negative. This feels appropriate.

- With everything happening in our society and in our workforce, it's going to get worse, not better unless there's some kind of intervention.
- Change language to reflect that it's a structural problem: "Failure of our community to meet this need to ensure..."

Pg. #6: "We Learned: ...63% of childcare providers in Gorham are below their licensed capacity"
Do we need this? This is misleading - COVID, staffing shortages, retirement preparation, etc.

- "Lack of workforce" - not just staffing shortages, but there are retirements and not a lot of new people coming into the field.

Note: Subsidy levels have changed. It would be good if we could make families in Gorham aware. Family of 4 can make up to \$95,000 and still receive a subsidy. So many people think it's only for baseline poverty. → how can we inform families?!?!?

- Once a family has a school-aged child, the schools become a distributor of important educational and community news. Prior to families joining the schools, how do they find information?
- CDS will share information, providers are supposed to, website

Pg. #9: re-format or add graphic for the Maine Data highlights

Strategic Goals and Objectives

Review goals - are these right, do they need changes?

Once we firm up these goals, as a group, collaborate and create *objectives* or *specific action steps*.

Goal #1:

- Ways to help support families to complete the subsidy application process → inform, provide support for completion, etc.
 - Advocate to the legislature - any way to have this be an automatic / check-box thing when submitting state taxes (they already have the documentation needed to verify eligibility)
- Request local legislative delegation work to make increasing infant and toddler child care spots a priority in policy & funding at state levels → also add an action step around making people aware of this work and any changes that occur.
- Not every provider has to accept the subsidies as well, even if a family is eligible - this is another area that needs to be considered ...
 - Encourage providers to complete the "Market Rate Survey" - now it's starting to ask about the true costs of running a childcare business.
 - Town can support and encourage local providers to complete this and figure out the true cost of care.

Goal #2:

Feedback: Is it the responsibility of the community to provide training for providers? It's great if they want to support. → Change language to "support" Caution on endorsing or promoting any one *type* of facility.

- Community of Practice - to continue
- When school has specific trainings that would be appropriate, at times that can be accessed by childcare providers.
- Adult Ed has done trainings for providers.

Goal #3:

Feedback: I don't know what this one exactly means. *Want to have a strong, sustainable childcare system in Gorham* (that would include centers, family, co-ops, head start).

- Connect w/MaineAYEC, Maine Afterschool Alliance - est. associations that reflect the childcare structure in the state
- Utilize the Community of Practice through Maine Roads to Quality.
- CTE program in Westbrook! Promoting this program in middle and high schools.
- Apprenticeship pathways
- Town itself puts up barriers to opening childcare centers → planning board, code enforcement. Collaborate w/Town to improve this environment.

Goal #4:

Feedback: Problem in focusing on children 3-4.

- Move the specific age piece OUT of the goal, but make it a very specific objective.
- Continue to provide early intervention strategies PD
- How to get that information out to families - can specialists w/in school system do webinars, do it through Adult Ed, family nights (specific for families who are not yet in the school system) → starting to build the relationship to the school system
 - Lean on Library and Rec Dept for this part?
 - Posting things places - Hannaford, Walgreens, Gorham Times

Goal #5:

- Meetings held at mutually agreeable times.
- Gorham can create a feedback form SEPARATE from CDS. Send out to providers.
- Questions: What do they love? What do they really not like?
- Going from C to B → a lot depends on the family, provider, where the CDS services are at
 - What can the community do about it?
 - Information, getting it out to families, understanding the work-arounds → repository of resources to help fill in these gaps
 - Key concepts and strategies from trained experts (OTs, PTs, etc) → check w/Heidi W.

Goal #6:

- Continuing some version of this group -> a steering committee w/key stakeholders
- Town Council committee -> rep from school board, rep from providers, rep from parent, rep from early elementary school ed
- "Gorham School Committee will host an annual Child Care Fair where families can learn about opportunities in the community and make informed decisions about their children's

care and education” → it makes more sense for *this* group to host it rather than the School Committee (or in partnership)

- Challenge in how this will be received if it “lives” in the School Committee or Town Council → it *has* to be collaboratively within the town *community*.
 - Challenge w/political stuff right now
 - Is it possible to have this become a sub-committee - something nonpolitical

Notes from Breakout Group 3

- Exciting to see this coming together, to see all our work organized and written out, feeling sense of accomplishment already
- Excited to look at pieces to take out at graphics, text boxes with quotes and anecdotes, and to add photos and pictures to the final copy
- The graph in the “why this is important” section already stands out and that information stuck on first review
- We need to look at how the data is worded for the general audience, some could be misread and misunderstood, for example, first three bullet points about the child care programs survey
- In the family survey section, change word “PreK” to “preschool” or have “preschool age children” since it makes it sounds like those children go to some different type of programs, really they are in PreK classrooms in their child care center, or they attend a center that doesn’t enroll infants and toddlers (like Gorham House)
- We should add a little about importance of young children developing secure attachments and why continuity of care is important, helps emphasize the importance of having a strong and stable workforce of early childhood teachers (if the turnover in ECE was happening in K-12, public and policymakers would be up in arms and acting fast)
- In the why it matters section, explain how ECE investment pays for itself, what exactly does that mean
- On page 11, in the introduction to the six goals, change the word challenges to opportunities
- We recommend changing the wording in goal #2 to something about improving collaboration, sharing expertise, and learning together, add child development to the end where play is named
- For goal #3, we came up with several strategies/activities including
 - Access to better compensation without increasing costs for families, state and federal public investment
 - Funding for early educators to complete credential and degrees without taking on debt
 - Ensuring the ECE workforce as access to benefits (health insurance and retirement), could created a state shared service model for those in child care or could include early educators in K-12 benefits
 - In Gorham work with high school Guidance counselors, Aspire Gorham, CTEs, and middle school teachers to introduce kids to the field of early education, when visiting area businesses, include a visit to an early care and education program
 - Include early childhood and K-12 in local careers directory, could have state ECE career directory
- For goal #4 we talked about a strategy around strengthening what parents know about child development and what to expect at each age and stage of development
- For goal #5 we talked about a having a form or communication strategy that brings “whole child” information from families and child care programs to the elementary school staff as

part of the routine process for all children, that information from parents and other caregivers and educators is welcome and used by Kindergarten teachers and other staff in the school, the expertise of those who have cared for and educated the children for the first five years is valued (not looked at as needing to start from a blank slate or from scratch)

- For goal #6 we talked about how to continue these types of meetings in some form, to have a Gorham Little Rams projects that works each year to implement the strategic plan and bring stakeholders together

First , Some background: When I went more deeply into the writing work, I found that two of our earlier goals actually nicely fit in under some of the others, so I consolidated what was 6 goals at our last meeting into 4 goals. Then for each goal, I used previous meeting notes and other resources to develop 3-4 draft objectives for each goal and then under each objective, I have listed 3-4 specific action steps. I also tried to go a little more deeply into the timeline piece by indicating short, mid, long term and/or ongoing work.

I've been spending A LOT of time with this data recently, which is good - but unfortunately, it also puts "blindness" on as a writer. You can get a little too close.

So once again, I NEED YOUR FEEDBACK to make sure I haven't veered too far off the path! THAT WILL BE THE PURPOSE OF THIS MEETING!

Understanding we already have feedback on changes to the narrative, data formatting and how to make the document flow better, etc. I need us to spend one more session fully focused on the goals, objectives and action steps to make sure I am not missing anything that people believe is crucial to this conversation moving forward.

With that in mind - here's what we'll do together:

1. Break out into FOUR groups (one for each identified goal).
2. Once in your groups, elect a note taker (notes can be handwritten or digital...whatever works best, but make sure you email me a copy when done).
3. Dive into the assigned goal and associated objectives and action steps and answer the following questions:
 - a. Does this goal accurately state what we want to accomplish? If not, suggested changes?
 - b. Is this goal too big? Should it be divided into smaller goals?
 - c. Is the goal too small and really should be an objective under another goal?
 - d. Do the action steps align to each objective?
 - e. Are the action steps realistic and "doable"?
 - f. Are there any goals, objectives or action steps that are missing? If so, what would you add and where?

Please make sure notes are taken and emailed to me. Nicole and Tara will be there for questions and comments and to keep the work on track. When you have either run out of things to talk about, or the clock has reached 7:15 you can stop. Take 15 minutes to share out highlights of your conversations with the whole group and then enjoy the rest of your evening!

We will meet again as a full group with a “beautified” and cleaned up version of the plan in August at least once...perhaps twice in order to finalize the document and prepare it to be shared publicly this fall BROADLY. I will send a doodle poll to schedule mid to late July. We’ll map that process out together...and YES - I WILL NEED YOUR VOICES as we share this work with our community!
