

## Works of Mercy Log and Reflections 2025-2026

Works of Mercy are the *Corporal* and *Spiritual* Works of Mercy.

They are actions we can perform that extend God's compassion and mercy to those in our everyday lives.

The "Works of Mercy" requirement replaces what was previously known as "service hours". Though your school may still require service hours for reasons outside of your Sacrament preparation.

Students do not log hours or the time spent on each work of mercy due to the nature of what each work may or may not consist of. A student may spend an hour "Praying For The Living And The Dead" but there is no time table to follow with regard to that specific Work of Mercy. Living a life of holiness doesn't come down to how many hours someone tracks trying to be holy. Living a life of holiness often requires living out such works of mercy to be great instruments of God's peace, regardless of how much time that specific mercy may or may not require.

- Students are to perform each of the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy prior to the last Confirmation Connection night. They are to write a very short reflection on each Works of Mercy performed and include how the Work of Mercy revealed any of the Gifts and Fruits of the Holy Spirit.
- Students are to choose one of the Works of Mercy experiences that stood out to them and on a separate paper write a one, full page, reflection with the same criteria but with deeper detail.
- These are to be submitted to Ryan Adamson at class or via parent email.
- The Works of Mercy should not be stressful, they should be memorable.

Feed The Hungry *Sharing food with someone in need, cooking at home for family, etc.	
Give Drink To The Thirsty *When hearing someone is thirsty providing them drink	
Shelter The Homeless *Any act of service to the homeless *Handout a "homeless kit"	
Visit The Sick *Visit someone in the hospital, sick at home, hospice, nursing care, etc.	
Visit The Imprisoned *Write or visit the homebound, hospice, nursing care, etc.	
Bury The Dead  *Attend a funeral  *Help clean cemetery	
Give Alms To The Poor *Donate/help during "feed your neighbor" weekends *Handout a "homeless kit"

Works of Mercy	Reflection
Counseling The Doubtful *Praying with someone who is struggling	
Instructing The Ignorant *Helping with homework, being patient with little siblings, etc,	
Admonishing The Sinner *Vocally standing up for what God wants even if it's not cool to do so.	
Comforting The Sorrowful *Being present for someone who is hurting. Listening, showing sympathy, gift giving, etc.	
Forgiving Injuries *Going out of the way to forgive rather than holding a grudge	
Bearing Wrongs Patiently *When wronged, taking a moment to breath before responding	
Praying For The Living And The Dead  *Set time aside to pray for those struggling and for those who have passed away.
