## Acts 10:34-43

34 Then Peter began to speak to them:

'I truly understand that God shows no partiality,

> <sup>35</sup>but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him.

the message
he sent
to the people of Israel,
preaching peace
by Jesus Christ
—he is Lord of all.

<sup>37</sup>That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced:

<sup>38</sup>how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power;

how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. <sup>39</sup>We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem.

They put him to death by hanging him on a tree;

<sup>40</sup>but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear,

but to us
who were chosen by God
as witnesses,
and who ate and drank with him
after he rose from the dead.

42 He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead.

<sup>43</sup>All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

## Matthew 28:1-10

After the sabbath,
as the first day of the week
was dawning,
Mary Magdalene
and the other Mary
went
to see the tomb.

<sup>2</sup>And suddenly
there was
a great earthquake;
for an angel of the Lord,
descending from heaven,
came
and rolled back the stone
and sat on it.

<sup>3</sup>His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow.

<sup>4</sup>For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men.

<sup>5</sup>But the angel said to the women, 'Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. <sup>6</sup>He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay.

<sup>7</sup>Then go quickly and tell his disciples,

"He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him."

This is my message for you.'

<sup>8</sup>So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples.

<sup>9</sup>Suddenly Jesus met them and said, 'Greetings!'

And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshipped him.

## **Reading Acts This Week**

The lectionary in this Easter season selects speeches from Acts
The book presents itself as 'Volume 2 of Luke' –
check out the opening lines

Picking up the story from Jesus' resurrection, Acts tells a story of the beginning of the church, reconciling movements of Peter and Paul, Jewish and Gentile

Weaving through the narrative, from demoralized disciples to Ascension and Pentecost, early commune, Peter's widened vision, Paul's missionary journeys, council in Jerusalem martyrdom and imprisonment, to Peter's end in Rome...

We get these speeches, put in the mouths of one apostle or another, in this case Peter summing up 'volume one', and claiming the 'Great Commission' mandate

Could you repeat such a speech in public?

I your minister repeated it, which parts rub you wrong?

What's missing in this 'elevator speech',
to train our witness to our successors in faith?

## **Reading the Gospel This Week**

The lectionary gives us options of which story to use – I'm choosing Matthew's Easter, in this 'Year of Matthew' You can compare the alternatives!

Two women go to the tomb in this version, and they see the angel roll the stone away, and so do the terrorized guards

The angel speaks, invites them to look, then tells them to go tell the disciples Do they look? How far do they go?

They suddenly meet Jesus on the way What's your movie about that? He repeats the commission to go tell

What's missing, that you love from other stories? What's added, not in the other stories?

Does your Jesus movie include these special effects, graves open, zombies walking around, angels and voices?
