



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

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• 1940's | Grace Lee Boggs organized alongside Black auto workers in Detroit to denounce World War II.








• 1950's - 1960's | "Bengali Harlem" - when South Asians took root in Harlem moving from the South, and merged with the Black community. South Asian men would marry Black and Latina women.

Malcolm X would debate the tenets of Islam with Bengali friends. Miles Davis was also noted to be going over Bollywood tracks while in Harlem.

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






• 2013-present | Black & Asian solidarity through Black Lives Matter, and later Stop Asian Hate. At the height of the Black Lives Matter movement, Asians were educating their own communities on combating anti-Blackness and embracing pro-Blackness. Similarly for the Stop Asian Hate movement with Black Lives Matter and other Black-led organizations educating about combating anti-Asian hate and embracing a pro-Asian American lens.
