Welcome! This course is designed to satisfy a college freshman composition and literature class. With this in mind, reading and writing assignments are challenging and engaging. The AP exam may seem like our end goal, and it is important; however, the ultimate goal is to provide students with skills to read and write critically about literature which has defined the human experience. Similarly, students will need to understand general style and techniques various authors and artists use; as well as, specific literary methods authors implement in writing short stories, novels, plays, and poetry. The following year has been designed to allow the maximum exposure to great literary works from relevant historical periods and important cultural voices.

Senior students are allowed <u>no more than 120 cumulative class period absences</u> in order to participate in the Samohi graduation ceremony. This number is for both excused and unexcused absences and includes college visits.

FALL

The semester is broken up into three grading periods: GP1, GP2,, GP3.

Culminating Assignments: The Poetics Comprehension Quiz; Soliloquy Parody; journal entries, AP Timed Practice; Source Analysis; FINAL: Tragedy Monologue Performance and Written Explanation

<u>Independent Reading</u> (see blog link: Titles from Open Response Questions) Choose 1-2 titles, depending on length, and complete by the end of the semester. Expect monthly progress checks.

You must read

Poetry: one sonnet by Petrarch and one sonnet by Shakespeare

Comedy: A Modest Proposal by Jonathan Swift
Tragedy: see Titles from Open Response Questions

Consider sharing some portion of your independent choice. Surveys, lessons, discussions, reading journal entries, art and music are just some of the ways people like to share what they are reading.

ILLUMINATE

Please check Illuminate often to make sure that all of your assignments are up-to-date and graded. Turned in items are organized, graded, and filed until returned to the student. If you know you turned in an item, yet it is still missing, it is either still being graded or you neglected to put your name on the assignment --this happens often. Email me or stop by during lunch if you are at all concerned about your grade.

Homework is often practice or an extension of lessons introduced in class and require speaking and writing to a particular topic, or preparing for an assessment.

Tardies, Absences and Behavior

Daily class attendance is essential; Students with excused absences will be allowed to make up missing assignments. Students are expected to be on time, prepared, respectful, and responsible. Each member of our class is expected to contribute to a positive learning community, where all students feel welcome and safe.
