

Welcome to German III! You have chosen to study the German language, and the countries where it is spoken - a wise move! Here is why:

- 1.) German is the native tongue of almost 100 million Europeans, making it the single largest language community in Europe!
- 2.) Germany is among the five most important trade partners of the United States. Hundreds of German, Swiss, and Austrian companies doing business here and in Europe, are looking for job applicants with basic to advanced German language skills.
- 3.) The economies of Germany, Switzerland, and Austria are among the most robust not only in Europe, but the world.
- 4.) The cultural and technical achievements past and present of the German speaking countries reach far beyond their borders and live on in food, music, clothing, literature, and automobiles across the U.S.
- 5.) When traveling to Germany, Switzerland, Austria, or Liechtenstein, knowing German will make it easier for you to meet people and fully appreciate the culture. Besides, you will come across as being well educated.
- 6.) Upon graduation from Hamilton High School, you have the opportunity to earn retroactive credits from a UW-System University. You could be a sophomore by the end of your freshman year and earn up to 15 credits.

Recipe for Success

- A. <u>Goal</u>: The goal of the Deutsch III is to develop communicative and cultural skills relating to the German language. Possessing communicative skills in the target language will enable the student to socialize, provide and acquire information, express personal feelings and opinions, and get others to adopt a course of action.
- B. <u>Complete homework carefully</u>: The assignments you will be given are your written practice for new material. Use your notes, and vocabulary lists to do these exercises, and **think** about what the German means to you. Daily homework assignments are worth up to five points each, with points deducted if sloppy, incomplete, or poorly done. Late work is accepted only after an excused absence, and *you are responsible* for finding out what you missed.
- C. <u>Grading</u>: Successful academic achievement is attained in large part via a well-organized, proactive approach to learning. There are many opportunities for success in this course. Grades are based on total points earned within each category. Extra credit is not offered, nor are grades rounded.

- D. <u>Classroom behavior</u>: Proper respectful behavior is expected. Our responsibility to one another is not only to help one another learn German, but to help each other become greater citizens of our global society. Behavior contrary to these ideals or behaviors that violate our classroom environment will not be tolerated. Students can expect phone calls to parents, or intervention with school administration.
- E. <u>Extra help</u>: I am more than happy to help students with German-related and other questions. Please feel free to see me if you feel a bit behind, or if you don't understand something we covered in class.

- F. <u>Cheating</u>: Cheating is a serious offense. In general, cheating includes any attempt to pass off another person's work as your own or any attempt to gain a grade through deceit or a distortion of the truth. Unless specifically stated by the teacher in writing, all work turned in for credit, is to be authentic and completed by YOU. It will not be copied from a "partner" because you "worked together", nor will it be copied and pasted from an online translator. Work cannot be recycled from previous classes or assignments. Those students caught cheating will receive an automatic zero for that assignment, quiz, or test.
- G. <u>Cell Phones</u>: There is a time and a place to be checking your cell phone. In the middle of class is not the time to do so. Student use of cell phones, electronic paging or two-way communication devices during school hours is prohibited, except as specifically authorized by the building principal or in accordance with the Acceptable Use Agreement for Student Use of Personal Technology Devices on School Grounds (BYOD)(365.1-Exhibit2). Any student found violating this policy shall be disciplined accordingly. If I see cell phones out when it should be in the classroom phone caddy, I will then follow the protocol below:

1st offense – verbal warning; phone goes in caddy 2nd offense – phone taken by teacher and turned into the office
