- From Annette Gardner: Becky, this is great, have you provided resources specifically for rural communities?
- From Becky Selig (CDPHE): Unfortunately, we still struggle with resources specific for rural communities, but we should probably try to parse things out that are specific to (or serve) rural communities
- From Ann Elifrits: We're trying to keep meeting virtually, including our regional coalition folks. Also sending resources, newsletters out to coalition members. Strategizing about promoting survivor ECHOS and other virtual supports since clinics are overwhelmed
- From John O'Donnell : In Louisiana we have re-opened a min-grant program that we have that provides seed funding to organizations around the state to do social determinant work. Right now we're focused on projects that specifically address food policy to make sure that those who are or who have become food insecure have access to healthy fresh and local food.
- From John O'Donnell : We're also using the time as a capacity building opportunity for many of our local and regional leadership with a specific lens of virtual meeting facilitation and network building.
- From Elaine Russell : Luckily, our coalition and committees are familiar with meeting by zoom. We know there are several organizations that are considering budget cuts, furloughs and more. We are listening to how we can support them.
- From Becky Selig (CDPHE) : The Colorado Cancer Coalition has also upped their zoom membership and purchased webinar capabilities - they've made their account available to partners who may not have a zoom account and have also offered to help provide TA with using zoom for virtual meetings or support programs
- From Klopez: We are focusing on survivors

Suggestions for future Zoom Check-In topics:

- From ShannonBacon : Thinking ahead to a potential convening need/role when screening resumes (how do we ensure partners are all ready, coordinated) would be a helpful topic
- From Ann Elifrits : I hope the media campaign we plan to start here in about a month is helpful to re-start folks thinking about cancer screening
- From banastasio : Information on research studies related to Covid & Cancer would be great
- From Anne Snowden : I echo the suggestion for info on research studies related to COVID and cancer.
- From Aysha Sheikh : Is there a way we can integrate cancer prevention messaging along with COVID-19 information/messaging? For example, while you are on walks, don't forget your sunscreen! Has anyone developed this kind of messaging? Thanks!
- From star.jones : Wyoming will be doing a radon media campaign since everyone is stuck in their homes at this time- it's the perfect time to promote radon testing.
- From Ann : Virginia likes the idea of integrating the messaging...if someone has created some of these, we'd love for you to share!
- From lindsaykelly : Idea for next meeting - what are large states doing to reach all members of the state especially in large states like new york, texas, california, etc. Do you break up the state in different regions?

April 28, 2020 Session Chat Summary

Questions asked by participants in chat of the presenters from CDC and ACS (some of these questions were discussed during the session, please refer to the recording for more information):

- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: We have had anecdotal reports that some GI procedures can be high risk for COVID-19 transmission for the health care providers - do you anticipate whether there will be guidance related stool vs colonoscopy screening?
- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: Also, will the CDC/ACS create resources (handouts, social media, etc.) to help us encourage people to return to screenings and HPV vaccination?
- Nashon Hornsby: will guidance come out regarding screening of people following the peak of the pandemic? wondering if there will be national guidance so that states are not taking different approaches?
- Nashon Hornsby: if guidance is not going to be provided to states, is there a plan to get sound recommendations out to primary care providers (including for women's health) and oncologists?
- teri.wood: For colon screening it seems to make sense to emphasize stool based tests for average risk individuals and improved provider methods of taking risk history to determine which folks to send to colonoscopy..... any movement on that nationwide?
- Berlinda Olivier: Any movement for MCO coverage for color guard as a screening option?
- Jaime Adler: I've been hearing about drive-through immunizations - will there be support or recommendations on this re HPV vaccines?
- Miriam Karanja: Can CDC Comp Cancer Control please take a lead on developing messaging for us so that we can be consistent.
- Carla Williams: Public transit is currently limited. Bus and train travel may not allow social distancing. Are there guidelines for safe ride sharing for cancer patients to reduce infection risk?
- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: What role with ACS/CDC take in funding the testing prior to cancer screening and care?
- teri.wood: What would it take for CDC to open up use of grant funds for innovative ways to increase screening post covid - like mailed FIT or use of Cologuard
- Miriam Karanja: I like the idea of increasing mailed FIT tests? Can CDC recommend that?
- Miriam Karanja: Can CDC provide some new messaging on healthy eating, exercise, drive by HPV vaccination and FIT Kits?

Comments/Suggestions related to CRC screening:

- DBrooks: FQHCs are another source of primary care to the underserved and many are struggling to keep their doors open as well
- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: I think testing important, but if that costs more - then it will create more disparities.
- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: Primary care in Kansas are often local county health department medical directors, manages the hospital admissions and are currently losing money in their practice as people are afraid to come in
- Senkuta Riverson: also, the process for testing after positive FIT test
- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: And not just access to colonoscopy - we don't have access to cancer care if they are not urgent
- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: People are delayed for non urgent care - I am sure will open soon

- teri.wood: I think we have to balance screening - most of which will be normal - with fear of not being able to immediately do follow-up
- ann.m.elifrits: interesting discussion I heard recently re increased risk of OUD for people with CRC

Opportunities coalitions can build on during this time (e.g. vaccination and other prevention efforts, telehealth, internet access, equitable access to care/services, policy interventions, etc.):

- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: Many of us are in the process of reviewing plans - we know we need to address the pandemic, just have not figured out how, would love to see other objectives and strategies
- Miriam Karanja: Arkansas was in the process of updating our Cancer Plan. :)
- Joshua Mammen: I wonder if there is a way to leverage the interest COVID vaccines to emphasize the importance of vaccination (including HPV) and later (when there is a COVID vaccine), combine administration with HPV vaccination.
- Brenda Anastasio: Nemours set up an outside vaccination tent for peds
- Miriam Karanja: There is some drive by hearing screenings in my community in Little Rock, Arkansas.
- Kathleen -CRIHB: yes, drive by, just like during flu season
- Zul Surani: thank you for the push around prevention. I agree to keep that on everyone's radars through many modalities while people are at home.
- Brenda Anastasio: When it comes to vaccination HPV and other- more important than ever that providers follow the "no missed opportunities" model
- teri.wood: In KY we have one FQHC in particular that is referring for Cologuard during telehealth calls at this time
- Joshua Mammen: As telehealth becomes more important, perhaps access to high speed Internet becomes a new area of emphasis as we look at health equity.
- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: Telehealth rules and access to broadband is a great policy initiative for our cancer plans
- Lisa Richardson: Hope, the time is ripe to push broadband for what we do
- Aubrey Villalobos (GW): Telehealth reimbursement too, which varies by payor, in places where broadband and tech is available.
- Sarah Shafir (American Cancer Society): Centers for state, tribal, local, territorial support has pivoted and allowing grantees to redirect resources to support COVID-19 related activities. We are doing that with our projects and asking partners to focus on COVID-19 related activities for cancer patients. CSTLTS is leading!
- Aubrey Villalobos (GW): Colorado recently made some nice policy changes around telehealth access for Medicaid.
- teri.wood: There are definitely parts without telehealth - the FQHC I was referencing is in a high poverty Appalachian area. If you don't have broadband then that is a barrier - but for places that have access why would we not use it?
- Lisa Richardson: Yes, lots of providers are being denied for telehealth visits
- gailm: Medicare may not pay for telehealth without video
- Lisa Richardson: that's what i heard this morning... No video, no payment
- Karin Hohman - SHC: Regarding updating cancer plans - disparities, health equity should become even more important and show up in objectives and strategies - front and center!
- Aubrey Villalobos (GW): Colorado's example is for video, telephone and live chat telehealth!

- Klopez: WA state is reimbursing the tribal clinics at full rate for telehealth
- Miriam Karanja: Recommendations need to come from coalitions who are working on the ground.
- Lisa Richardson: I agree Miriam
- Missouri Ca Consortium Chair - Hope Krebill: Missouri Cancer Consortium Ex. Committee is meeting monthly to have this exact discussion.
- Karen D: Are states / localities not allowed to use covid funds for infrastructure issues, such as internet services, water, electricity, etc. so they can address covid issues?
- Ray Michael Bridgewater: Usage of tele-health medical mobile unit combine w/ virtual hospital set up is in planning for several states [rural / city]
- Nashon Hornsby: In fact, there is a strong likelihood that COVID-19 will not be in our rear view mirror within the next 12 months. So we do need to plan for any future sheltering in policy implementation.
- Zul Surani: We are interested in prevention related programming that we can share with our coalition members and communities
- Joshua Mammen: I am fascinated by the discussion of reviewing current screening recommendations and looking on how to adjust them in concerted fashion (all be on the same page) in the post COVID era.

- TN – Doing a “welcome” call to new members to review the plan, find a role for them in coalition workgroups
- CO – When promoting things the coalition is doing, highlight which plan goal/objective it aligns with in the plan

- From Katie Bathje, ACS: Yes, Bryan! Healthcare providers and researchers are often looking for opportunities to 'volunteer' in the community. A cancer coalition can be a great option for them! Bio-tech and pharma companies can be helpful at making connections.
- From Katie Jones, Iowa CCC Program: Genentech was one of the sponsors of the Iowa Cancer Consortium's (Iowa's cancer coalition) annual meeting/conference, the Iowa Cancer Summit
- From Katie Bathje: Reach out to an organization's Board that is related to your work (or that you would like to see engaged in your work) and volunteer for their Board or a working committee. Getting support from a higher-level staffer of a NCI designated Cancer Center or other large Cancer Center in your state can elevate your message as a coalition.
- From Aubrey Villalobos: You can see case studies here from 9 coalitions who worked closely in 2022 with their NCI cancer centers on EBI implementation (due to be published in January) <https://cancercontrol.cancer.gov/research-emphasis/supplement/coe>

The health equity-focused video highlights work that is being done by the Consortium in partnership with Holden Comprehensive Cancer Center in establishing a community steering committee focused on Black Iowans and cancer disparities. - From Allison Antoine, Wisconsin: Brian mentioned this a little bit but showing up at our members' (and non-member) events is important and now that in-person events are coming back on the calendar it is so great to get face time with folks again.
- From Katie Jones, Iowa CCC Program: In Iowa, we also have had luck working with our Medicaid Managed Care Organizations (MCOs). Since we have an existing relationship with our current MCOs, when a new MCO was announced fairly recently, representatives from the new MCO were interested in joining our meeting since they knew the other MCOs were already engaged. Videos are so powerful! The Iowa Cancer Consortium has many videos of cancer survivors sharing their stories (for example related to radon and HPV vaccination), and those videos continue to inspire new advocates today.
