


Time and Place - Exploring the dynamic relationships between people, place and time supports understanding of perspectives and events to make meaning of the world.






Covers major turning points in Canadian history, including Confederation and early governance. Excellent for connecting political changes to social contexts.

The Beaver: A Story of the Fur Trade by Barbara Greenwood


This engaging book is part of a series that introduces young readers to the history of the fur trade through a fictionalized story of a beaver's life and its importance to the fur trade industry.
