Project Objective: Create a ceramic phone speaker that utilizes structural and / or specific design elements from a piece of ceramics found in the history of Ceramics

Project Criteria:

- This piece should be hand-built with coils, slabs, pinch, or a combination, and should CLEARLY relate to ceramics in your culture of choice.
 - o This can happen with the form, although you may choose to use a more contemporary form.
 - This MUST happen with your surface: please choose a surface that has texture and/or patterning on it.
 - (We will discuss different examples and how they might have been made as you determine how to make yours)
- Your speaker MUST FIT YOUR phone. When we test it you will need to use your own phone. It is
 imperative you account for some shrinking of the clay as it dries and is fired. You will lose points if
 your phone does not fit.
- Refinement of all aspects of your forming is expected.
