- Economic Opportunities: Despite fluctuations, Russia remains a significant global economy, ranking 11th by nominal GDP in 2021 (World Bank data).
- Scientific and Technological Advancements: Russian proficiency is crucial for accessing research and collaborating in space exploration and nuclear technology.
- Cultural Heritage: Russian literature, arts, and media continue to have global influence, requiring language skills for cultural exchange and analysis.
- Cybersecurity: With the rise of cyber threats, Russian language skills are increasingly valuable in the tech and security sectors.

The U.S. government's commitment to Russian language education is evident through programs like Language Flagship, which reported 24 Russian Flagship students in 2019-2020 (Language Flagship Annual Report, 2020). Furthermore, the Boren Awards, which focus on critical languages, have consistently included Russian among their priority languages.
