## PROJECT OVERVIEW

2024 BORDERLINES STUDENT ARTIST RESIDENCY opportunities are part of a larger, multifaceted exhibition and community arts project lead by Matthew Villarreal with support from Parsons School of Design, Casa Otro Gallery, Borderland Arts Initiative, The Bishop Gallery, and the Chan Family Foundation.

The larger mission of the BORDERLINES project is to foster collaboration, dialogue, and community engagement between The New School's Parsons School of Design and artists, institutions of higher education, and community arts organizations from the El Paso-Juárez-Las Cruces Borderplex región. This project aims to create spaces for artistic expression, exploration of cultural identity, and critical reflection on inter/personal border politics, using the specific context and landscape of the Borderplex region as the starting point for a broader conversation .

The larger vision of the BORDERLINES project is to facilitate meaningful connections and exchanges between individuals and communities from diverse backgrounds, challenging perceptions and bridging geographical, cultural, and ideological divides. By providing opportunities for creative collaboration, the project seeks to challenge preconceived notions of self in relation to otherness and promote understanding, empathy, and solidarity among participants.

The student residency opportunities are meant to provide students meaningful ways to immerse themselves in artistic exploration, cultural exchange, and community engagement. Through these residencies, students have the opportunity to collaborate with fellow artists and develop their creative practice in a supportive and inspiring environment. Additionally, the residencies aim to foster personal and professional growth by providing hands-on experience, exposure to diverse perspectives, and the opportunity to engage with local communities. Overall, the residencies offer students a unique opportunity to expand their artistic horizons, contribute to meaningful dialogue, and make a positive impact through their creative endeavors.

## WHAT TO EXPECT DURING THE RESIDENCY

Students can anticipate engaging with the rich legacy of art, community building, and cultural activism. Throughout the residency, students will reside on-site in provided housing and will be provided with dedicated time and space to create.

This immersive experience will facilitate collective learning in the following ways:

• Students encounter inspiring examples of thriving in the arts within a framework that challenges traditional power structures often rooted in white supremacy.

- Participants learn from expansive models demonstrating how creative practice and community engagement can yield significant societal impact, with an emphasis on interconnected social, artistic, cultural, and political contexts.
- Students have the opportunity to establish reciprocal connections with the local community, fostering meaningful engagement and mutual benefit.

## WHAT TO EXPECT AFTER THE RESIDENCY

Overall, the post-residency phase offers student artists the chance to continue their artistic journey and share their perspectives with the broader community.

Students selected as artists in residence at any of the three sites will have the opportunity to exhibit their work alongside a small group of pre-selected working artists in exhibitions planned for Winter 2024-2025. Works included in the exhibition are not limited to what was produced while in residence.

Recognizing that a two-week residency is brief, the organizers acknowledge that it may feel as though it just began as it draws to a close, potentially offering limited time to complete substantive work. However, artists are encouraged to view this as an opportunity to experience elements that influence or inform their creative process more deeply than the mere execution of existing ideas. The goal is for artists in residence to absorb what they learn through the mentorship process and engagement with the community, culture, and/or landscape/city.

Participating in these exhibitions provides students with a platform to showcase their artwork to a wider audience and engage in ongoing dialogue surrounding border politics and cultural identity. Moreover, it affords student artists the opportunity to further develop their artistic practice, gain exposure, and potentially connect with other professionals in the field.

Parsons and the organizing team of this project will not be not be confirming travel eligibility of applicants and will not be providing passport or visa support. 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## **FUTURE OPPORTUNITIES**

#### Fall 2024

An open call for time-based, 2D, and 3D student work will go out Fall 2024 to students from Parsons (including Parsons Scholars Program), NMSU, DACC, UTEP and EPCC. The solicitation of the open call will include a virtual info session regarding how to apply and will be shared via Parsons/The New School news blasts and social media accounts, and the appropriate avenues for announcements that all other partners use.

Students will submit digital files (via a google form) of up to 3 works that strongly relate to the updated curatorial statement(s) Leslie Moody Castro constructs for the exhibitions. Work submitted must fit the following constraints:

- Time based works: video or audio no longer than 5 minutes, to be viewed on a digital projector
- 2D works: any medium on any surface but must be able no larger than 16"x20"x2" for shipping
- 3D works: must be able to fit in a USPS flat rate priority mail box, and must have clear, easy to follow instructions for installation and display.
- Installation proposals will not be selected

Exhibitions containing work from pre-selected working artists, along with the work from students selected for residency opportunities and the open call will be on display at Parson's Aronson Gallery, Casa Otro, Borderland Arts Initiative, and The Bishop Gallery. Each exhibition site will be uniquely curated by a curatorial team lead out by Leslie Moody Castro which will make final selections of work and finalize the layout.

Public Programming during the run of each show will also be shared by all participating institutions. Programming can include virtual artist panels, viewing nights for selected video work, and workshops led by artists open to students and the wider public.

Additional artist residency opportunities will be available to students Summer 2025 at Borderland Arts Initiative.

#### LEAD ORGANIZERS

**Matthew Villareal** is an artist, community advocate, and educator from El Paso, TX with over 15 years of experience working with BIPOC youth and first-generation college students. He is currently an Assistant Professor of Art, Design, and Social Justice at the New School's Parsons School of Design. Before joining Parsons in 2019, Matthew worked as a high school teacher and college-access administrator in various Title I schools. His creative practice blends pedagogy, artmaking, and activism with the aim of building space for whole communities to deepen community confidence and creative capacity; this is often through facilitating healing and grounding ceremonies, workshops, exhibitions, and exchanges. Matthew is the 2023 Spring/Summer artist in Residence at the Border Arts Residency, a recent AAM Museum Education Fellow and a current AICAD BIPOC Academic Leadership Institute Fellow.

BORDERLAND ARTS INITIATIVE is a 30,000 square foot complex located near the border in downtown El Paso, Texas, whose mission is "To cultivate community through exhibition, performance, education and the development of artistic expression.". Funded by the Villareal Panetta Foundation, the Initiative offers exploratory lessons in fine and performing arts for all ages and includes a 300 seat theater and art gallery. Executive Director Davdi Grabarkewitz comes from the New York City Opera where he was Resident Director, and the El Paso Opera where he served as Artistic and General Director. He has taught at the Boston Conservatory of Music, the New England Conservatory of Music and the Hartt Conservatory. His staging of Madame Butterfly for PBS' Live From Lincoln Center won the PrimeTime Emmy Award for Best Live Performance and toured Japan with the New York City Opera.

**Nathan Allan Smith** is a professional photographer based in New York City and Mesilla, New Mexico, earning his MFA in 2010. His gallery and collaboration space, Casa Otro is a manifestation of hope to build a bridge between the border community and the rest of the world. Hosting in a variety of ways, artists and thinkers from around the world whose work reflects and expands a shared social value and vision of connectedness. Giving

opportunities for the local community to have proximity to art and artists they might not normally have access to, while at the same time giving opportunity to these artists to work and be enriched by the cultural wealth of the local community and greater borderplex area.

Isadora Stowe is a New Mexican based multimedia artist and arts professor in El Paso, TX whose work focuses on the narrative of environment translated and coded into complex psychological landscapes. Stowe grew up in the southwest border region, living and working in New Mexico, Texas and Mexico. She credits these experiences for providing a heightened awareness of geographical and political boundaries, and a fascination with the exploration of identity of self and the construction of home in her work. Stowe is the recipient of several grants, scholarships, and awards for her work, including an Award for Excellence from the New Mexico Committee of the National Museum of Women in the Arts, and recipient of the Outstanding Achievement for Faculty Award from El Paso Community College. She is dedicated to making the world a better place for Artists from all points of origin and serves on many local and national committees and on the board of directors for the Texas Association of Schools of Art and Bordersenses, a non-profit which promotes arts in the binational region.

# LEAD CURATOR

Leslie Moody Castro is an independent curator and writer whose practice is based on itinerancy and collaboration. She has produced, organized, and collaborated on projects in Mexico and the United States for more than a decade, and her repertoire of critical writing is also reflective of her commitment to place. She is committed to creating moments of artistic exchange and dialogue and as such is a co-founder of Unlisted Projects, an artist residency program in Austin, Texas. In 2017, she was selected as Curator and Artistic Director of the sixth edition of the Texas Biennial and was recently the first invited curator in residence at the Galveston Artist Residency. Moody Castro earned a master's degree at The University of Texas at Austin in Museum Education with a portfolio supplement in Museum Studies in 2010, and a Bachelor's degree in Art History at DePaul University in Chicago in 2004, and has been awarded two grants from the National Endowment of the Arts for her curatorial projects (2016, 2017). In addition to her firm belief that the visual arts creates moments of empathy, Moody Castro also believes that Mariachis make everything better.
