MANY are those who feel that the world is immeasurably the poorer by the death on Sunday morning of the Rev. John Sheehy, C.C., Courtmacsherry, for they know there has departed from the scene one whose most compelling motive, next to the faithful exercise of his sacred calling, was to make it a better place for every one to live in. A good priest; an able, cultured, erudite man, of dynamic energy, with a boyish ardour and enthusiasm that could not be quenched; a kindly, entertaining companion and a sincere friend, his like will not soon be seen again.

His all too brief life was eminently a useful one, abundantly fulfilling the promise of his early years.

In his youth he combined unusual intellectual gifts with a remarkable proficiency in practically all forms of manly sport.

Later on his talents found scope in many directions. He had distinct literary attainments and several noteworthy contributions came from his pen.

STRICKEN PARENT.

The news of his death sent a wave of grief throughout County Cork and far beyond its confines. In his native Skibbereen it caused feelings of profound sorrow, the poignancy being all the keener because of the loss sustained by his stricken father, Mr. Timothy Sheehy, M.C.C., U.D.C., one of the best known figures of his time and a pillar of the public life of this country for generations.

The stunning character of the blow was, however, felt everywhere, especially in Barryroe and Courtmacsherry, where Father Sheehy was intimately known and loved.

He felt the first effects of illness on Friday night, and the symptoms rapidly developed until about noon on Sunday, when he passed suddenly away.

Born in Skibbereen about 1892, the late Father Sheehy was a son of Mr. Timothy Sheehy, M.C.C. He was a nephew of Rev. Joseph Sheehy, C.M., who was up to a few years ago Dean of All Hallows, Dublin, and of the late Rev. Morgan Sheehy, P.P., Leap. A brother of his, Fr. Thomas Sheehy, is working in the Foreign Mission field in the Brooklyn Diocese, New York.

The late Fr. Sheehy received his early education in Skibbereen, whence he went to Castleknock College, Co. Dublin, to continue his studies. Having been chosen by Dr. Kelly, late Bishop of Ross, for his native diocese, he went to the Irish College, Rome, in 1910.

ORDAINED IN MAYNOOTH.

Following the closing down of the latter, during the European War, the late Fr. Sheehy was transferred to Maynooth, to be ordained there in 1916. His first appointment was as Chaplain to Clonakilty Hospital, where he remained for twelve months. In this, his first, appointment in the mission field, the young priest found ample scope for the development and expression of those priestly qualities that came to be so characteristic of him in later years. Amongst the aged, the sick and infirm, he was a constant visitor, and displayed an early devotion to the duties of his high calling.

His personal piety, courage, forbearance, unbounded charity and ready sympathy never failed to impress themselves.

He had, too, an unfailing good humour in face of any difficulty. These were some of the salient features of a personality that became loved throughout the length and breadth of his native diocese.

WORK IN COURTMACHERRY.

Then nine years ago he came to Courtmacherry, where he was again indefatigable in his priestly labours. Even so, he found much time to improve the village. He began with the installation of public water pumps in the village, and followed up with the construction of a promenade in the centre of the village. His next efforts on behalf of the village were towards the laying out of a Golf Links. To-day that links stands a memorial to his untiring zeal. Finally, the advent of the E.S.B. was entirely due to his initiative, and with what prolific results—electric light in almost every house, and above all, in the Church. In a few weeks the village will be publicly lit, but it is to be regretted that he died before he saw the results of his long and almost lone agitation.

He did everything for everybody and never spared himself, being possessed of unbounded generosity.

When the end came, though very sudden, he was the same bright, cheery sagairt that we all knew so well.

The late Father Sheehy was by far the most brilliant preacher in his native diocese, as well as being a sound theologian. He is the author of several successful plays and had a distinct literary leaning. As a lecturer he was very popular.

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THE FUNERAL.

A remarkable manifestation of sympathy was forthcoming at the funeral on Tuesday. Clergy and laity from all parts of the County Cork and from many places outside it were present, and in the presence of those who loved him the mortal remains of the dead priest were laid to rest beside the little church where his voice had so often been heard.

It was natural that the western portion of the diocese of Ross should be particularly strongly represented.

All business in the village ceased for the duration of the Requiem Mass and funeral. Closed doors and drawn blinds marked all the houses and the ships in the little bay had their flags at half-mast. Hundreds of people travelled by car to Courtmaesherry for the funeral and the congregation which assisted at the Mass overflowed into the grounds.

The Bishop of Ross, Most Rev. Dr. Casey, presided at the Requiem Mass and Office, at the conclusion of which the interment took place in the churchyard.
