# **Financial Aid**

# Putting observed practices to work

This activity walks you and your team through a collection of observed practices — good ideas from lean institutions that are making progress in narrowing attainment gaps and increasing student success. Let them serve as a source of inspiration for brainstorms.

### **Observed practice**

<u>Allocate budget for emergency financial aid</u> to help students during financial difficulties; include students at risk of dropping out or having recently dropped out with only a few credentials left (last-mile programs)

### To discuss

- What are some of the typical student scenarios at our institution that might benefit from emergency financial aid?
- Which scenarios occur late in the student experience (i.e., close to credential completion)?
- How might we allocate funds for emergency financial aid?

### **Observed practice**

<u>Create tuition pledge</u> freezing tuition at entering rates for students who continuously enroll and complete in 100 or 150% of typical time

#### To discuss

- How might a tuition pledge from the institution encourage students to keep on track toward efficient credentialing?
- What would it take for our institution to be in a position to offer a tuition pledge?

### **Observed practice**

<u>Deliver proactive debt-reduction advising</u> and financial literacy training through financial aid counselors to both incoming and continuing students

### To discuss

- How might financial aid counselors help prospective and current students make sound financial decisions regarding their education?
- How might counselors help students understand the realities of their choices post graduation?

### **Observed practice**

Offer targeted institutional aid to help expand access to socioeconomically diverse students

### To discuss

•	How might financial aid be targeted to include students from a r	
	socioeconomic backgrounds?	

•	What might targeted	financial aid look like	at our institution?
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## **Observed practice**

<u>Differentially raise tuition and fees to a subset of students</u> in order to provide institutional aid to socioeconomically diverse students

#### To discuss

- What does it mean to differentially raise tuition and fees for a subset of students?
- How might we raise tuition for some students (i.e., based on major) in a way that's fair and inclusive of all students' socioeconomic status?
- How might students' enrollment decisions be affected by differential tuition?

### **Observed practice**

Design aid programs to incentivize students to receive academic support and advising

### To discuss

- How can aid and academic advising be linked in a way that appeals to students?
- What are the natural points in the student experience where aid and academic advising cross?

### **Observed practice**

Explore creative funding mechanisms to fund financial aid

### To discuss

- What are our institution's current creative funding mechanisms?
- What unexpected funding sources might be available to fund financial aid?

## **Observed practice**

<u>Restructure financial aid distribution</u> to promote responsible spending throughout the term (e.g., "Aid Like a Paycheck")

### To discuss

 How might financial aid be distributed in a way that encourages responsible sending?

## **Observed practice**

Conduct small financial aid pilots and evaluate impact before scaling, in order to maximize impact of each financial aid dollar

#### To discuss

- How does our institution currently handle financial aid packages?
  What experimentation do we currently do?
- How might we experiment with small financial aid disbursements?
- What encourages responsible spending through a term? What's most meaningful to students?
