This week's Parsha

This week's Parsha, Bereishit, recounts the creation of the world. There is however, something unusual about the creation story. In Genesis 1:3 the very first thing that God says in relation to creating the world is, וַנְאמֶר אֱלֹהֶים יְהֵי־אֲוֹר וַיְהִי־אֲוֹר (Yyomer Elohim ihi-ohr v'ihi-ohr, "And God said 'Let there be light' and there was light." This, in itself, is not unusual. What is unusual is that the sun and moon were not created until the fourth day.

This led me to examine the order of the creation story. First, there was light. Then, on Day Two, God created the heavens. Day Three brings us the creation of the earth and the seas as well as all of the vegetation that would grow from the earth. Day Four was the sun and the moon and Day Five brought with it all of the creatures that live in the water and skies. During Day Six, God begins by creating all of the other animals that had not been created yet. The very last thing that God creates is Man and Women to rule over all of the other things that God had created.

The order of creation is very deliberate and there is a symbiotic relationship that is established throughout the story of creation. Therefore, I feel very comfortable saying that the "light" that was created on the first day was not a physical light but a metaphorical one. It is the light that allows us to see the way to righteousness and acts of loving kindness.

During our daily morning service we recite the Yotzer Ohr prayer...

ָבָרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָ אֱלֹהַנוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, יוֹצֵר אוֹר וּבוֹרֵא חשָׁךְ, עֹשֶׁה שָׁלוֹם וּבוֹרֵא אָת הַכּל... בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה,

יוֹ, יוֹצֵר

הַמָּאוֹרוֹת

Blessed are you, Adonai our God, Ruler of the universe, who forms light and creates darkness, who makes peace and creates all things... Blessed are you, Adonai, who forms light.

I like to see this as a reminder that God created a light in which we can find our way towards caring for and improving the world in which we live.






