Inference and the Use of Cohesion Devices



Instructions: Read the texts carefully and pay attention to the highlighted portions. Can you find examples of the following kinds of cohesion devices?

- Anaphora: Reference back to an item previously mentioned in the text. "My brother stayed at my apartment last week. <u>He</u> left <u>his</u> dog here."
- Exophora: Reference to an item outside of the text. "That's his dog."
- **Lexical Substitution**: Using a similar lexical item to substitute for a previous one. "His dog ... that *animal*."
- Conjunction: Using links between propositions such as <u>and</u>, <u>but</u>, <u>so</u>...

Also, can you identify any inferences that a listener must make in order to comprehend the meaning of a statement?
