These have been repurposed from a community centre in East London and will form a new drama studio and workshops for our pupils and staff. The plan is for these to be operational later this year and provide a permanent home for drama with easy access to the hall and dance studio. They form part of a more comprehensive sustainability strategy we plan to implement over the coming years.

Finally, we are now well over halfway through this academic year. We have just over four weeks next half term and five weeks after Easter and then we are back into GCSE and A level examination season! Booster classes are taking place next week for those sitting exams, and revision at home should be well underway now!

University of Warwick Laboratory Skills Trip


On Thursday 14th December, the Key Stage 5 Chemists and Biologists were invited into the School of Life Sciences at the University of Warwick to enjoy a lesson and laboratory session on DNA, DNA replication and gel electrophoresis. This theoretical learning was then key to the practical work on Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) and gel electrophoresis which our students completed with confidence.

Once our gel electrophoresis was set up and running, our students were given a tour of the campus by existing undergraduates. It was an opportunity to see the different laboratories and lecture halls, walk through the campus seeing everything from the library to the canteen and ask questions along the way about what it is like to study both a STEM subject and life at university in general.



It All Adds Up

On Tuesday 9th January, twelve of our year 10 girls went to Oxford to participate in the 'It All Adds Up' event at the Mathematical Institution of the University of Oxford. The day started in one of the lecture halls with a very interesting talk by an Oxford University lecturer about the links and connections between geometry, number theory and iteration. The talk was very inspiring and really highlighted how problems in different areas of mathematics have a common thread that unites them all. After a short break, the girls had the opportunity to learn about games and strategy. During this activity, the girls were able to explore some two-player games and discover how mathematics can be used to beat their opponents.

The second part of the day found the girls forming small groups and testing their team-working skills by solving a variety of interesting and unique mathematical problems. This activity took place in a seminar room, and the girls were able to receive support from an undergraduate student from the University of Oxford. The girls did a fantastic job and were able to solve many of the challenging puzzles provided by the University.

performances across the board. Massive congratulations to all those involved - your practical examination marks will certainly reflect the hard work you all put into your performances!








Science Olympiads

Our KS5 students have been busy undertaking many an Olympiad this term. Olympiads provide the opportunity for our students to access the subject beyond the specification taught. They are designed to challenge and stretch our students and push them into the application of science outside of the classroom. For the third year running, we took part in round one of the UK Chemistry Olympiad and were exposed to questions which are designed to stimulate lots of debate regarding what chemistry entails and is an opportunity for us to showcase some of the skills needed at university and beyond.

Meanwhile, the Physics Department at Key Stage 5 has successfully organised two prestigious competitions: The British Physics Olympiad and The Astrophysics Challenge. These events were designed not only to test students' knowledge but also to cultivate their creative thinking skills. The British Astronomy and Astrophysics Olympiad (BAAO) competition aims to foster a deeper understanding of astronomical phenomena and encourage students to engage with the complexities of the universe. On the other hand, the British Physics Olympiad (BPhO) focuses on challenging students to apply their physics knowledge to solve intricate problems, fostering analytical thinking and problem-solving abilities. Both competitions serve as platforms for students to showcase their talents and passion for physics while honing essential skills for future academic and professional endeavours.

Finally, twenty-one students from years 12 and 13 completed the British Biology Olympiad Challenge. This competition challenges and stimulates students with an interest in biology to expand and extend their talents. Students were presented with topics and ideas which they are not familiar with to demonstrate their problem solving skills and understanding of core principles. Results will be released later this year for all of our Olympiads.

International Women and Girls in Science Day

While women and girls constitute approximately 50% of the population, their representation in science employment stands at around 30%. At The Reach Free School, we're actively working to shift these statistics!

In today's technology-driven era, the influence of social media is undeniable. Our pupils harnessed this power to raise awareness about women and girls in science. They crafted Instagram posts celebrating the achievements of female scientists while shedding light on the challenges they've faced and conquered.

We received numerous impressive entries, showcasing a diverse array of female scientists—from Ada Lovelace

in the 19th century to Jennifer Doudna, the 2022 Nobel Prize winner in Chemistry. These entries served as a source of inspiration for our female scientists at The Reach Free School and offered valuable insights to our male counterparts.

Our standout winner was Darcie S from 7J, whose exceptional entry highlighted Mae Jemison, the first African-American woman to venture into space. Runners-up included Stefania M from 8S, recognising Hedy Lamarr as the inventor of wifi; Lois T from 10J, spotlighting Tu Youyou for her groundbreaking discovery of a malaria treatment during the Vietnam War; and Serena P from 7C, who celebrated our very own female scientist, Miss Horner, science teacher here at The Reach Free School.

Witnessing the accomplishments of individuals who resemble us is truly empowering, serving as a reminder that we too can achieve remarkable feats.





Uniform, Appearance and Equipment

We would like to remind you to check the school's expectations in our <u>uniform policy</u> and ensure that your child has the correct uniform and a full complement of equipment when we return after half term. This includes consideration around nails, piercings and jewellery as well as hair colour, clothing and footwear. Please be aware that hair colours permitted must be colours that are natural as opposed to those that are clearly artificial such as blue or green for example. Any pupils who do arrive with hair colour that is not natural will be asked to change it and parents will be contacted.

Park and Stride

Have you considered dropping off and collecting your child a little further away from the school? Park and Stride schemes aim to reduce congestion around the school gates and provide a route where children can be active, healthier, and happier. The scheme benefits children by: making it safer around the school entrance; reducing traffic and helping us to maintain positive relationships with our neighbours on Long Lane and Drayton Ford where pupils should not be dropped off or collected from.

Please do not collect your child from the service road to Thames Water in Maple Cross. This area is frequently used by large lorries and therefore it is not a safe place for parents to collect their children. Please use the Denham Way layby slightly further into Maple Cross.

The 10 minute walking zone is from Springwell Avenue or further away from the school on the Mill End side

and Duran's Cafe/ Chalfont Road on the Maple Cross side of the school.

Cycling and Road Safety

All of our pupils who cycle to and from school must have a suitable helmet, which they must wear. Pupils will not be allowed to ride their bikes off the school site at the end of the day if they are not wearing a helmet.

We would like to encourage safe and sensible cycling to and from school, and pupils should not be riding in large groups on the road or pavement or when leaving the school site at the traffic lights.

As a reminder of other important safety measures for cyclists we have included a link here to the Highway Code for cyclists. We also have a cycle licence agreement, similar to our home school agreement, which outlines the school's expectations regarding cycling to and from school. Please take time to read through this with your child and complete the short Google form to acknowledge you have read and understood this if you wish for them to be able to cycle to and from school.

Please can you also speak to them about using their phones and having earphones in when travelling home as this hinders their ability to assess road hazards and listen to traffic, which is a vital part of keeping safe.

We provide an extensive amount of cycle parking onsite where pupils can lock their bikes during the day. We also provide a safe cycling scheme where a member of staff from the school will check your child's bike to ensure it is road safe and that they are riding safely to and from school. We are also able to provide additional information about the Highway Code for cyclists together with Bikeability courses and qualifications.

Pupils found to be breaking the Highway Code could have their permission to ride to and from school revoked.

Attendance, Punctuality and Illness

Attendance at school remains the most important aspect of your child's day - this allows them to access the learning and wider opportunities on offer. Attendance at school remains above the national average, but is significantly below the level seen prior to the pandemic. Our <u>letter</u> earlier this term outlines some of the key messages the school seeks to engender regarding attendance, and we ask that you relay these to your child.

You will be contacted daily if your child does not attend school and you have not informed our Attendance

Officer of a reason for your child's absence. Please be aware that persistent absences are reported to the local authority and can incur a fixed penalty notice.

If your child is late to school (without a valid reason) they will be expected to make the time up each week on a Thursday after school. Pupils who are late to lessons during the school day automatically lose a Reach Point. If your child is genuinely unwell, please contact the school and inform us through the absence email on: absence@reachfree.co.uk or call the school reception.

We ask that you do not email the main Admin account, Form Tutors or the Pastoral Team informing them of absences, and use the absence email instead.
