This indeed has been a major feature of my own journey in religious life and I found it of invaluable help when I worked in Africa and Europe.

It was at the age of eighteen when I left home and my country for the first time to go to the novitiate. At the time we were a large number of students coming from seven different countries: This brought me in contact with cultures and mentalities each having its own distinctive features. Initially I went through a cultural shock to find myself in a totally different environment and new way of doing things. But especially in those first few


years, I was engaged in trying to understand and accommodate a whole new set of values, while at the same time trying to be true to my own roots. Over the eight years of my religious formation, I was attentive to my own inner struggle, as well as that of others. Indeed I went through a lot of change as a result not only of growth and maturation, but especially because of my interaction with a new culture.

Indeed for me the opportunity to be exposed to different cultures has been one of the most enriching experiences of religious life. The word *culture* became for me the metaphor by which I was able to appreciate and differentiate the various experiences I was having.

The struggle which I personally went through, as well as listening to that of others with whom I was sharing my life, helped me in formulating and making a meaningful life choice as a consecrated Salesian. It has also produced in me an interest in the process of personal growth and spiritual maturity.

I consider myself to be truly blessed to have lived and worked with confreres and young people from countries all over the world. This has its challenges, but it has always been an exciting experience for me. And to know that there are confreres from other parts of the world, from different cultures and mentality, and who share the same Baptism, the same Profession and mission, and have the same father and founder Don Bosco has enriched my life as a Salesian of Don Bosco.
