Who Tells Your Story? - History Makerspace Project Instructions

Objective: Students will demonstrate understanding of the Industrial and/or Transportation Revolutions by designing a children's picture book through a makerspace activity.

Historical Background: The Industrial and Transportation Revolutions helped grow and transform the United States into the country that it became today. The various new inventions and innovations that were created during the mid-1800s, such as the steamboat by Robert Fulton and telegraph by Samuel F.B. Morse, influenced society, politics, and economics.

Instructions:

- 1. Using the various materials and resources provided, design a children's picture book focusing on one or more aspects of the Industrial and/or Transportation Revolution. For example...
 - inventor(s) / innovator(s)
 - invention(s) / innovation(s)
 - societal, political, and/or economic change(s)
- 2. At minimum, your story should be at least 10 pages long.
- 3. Each page should be fully illustrated.
- 4. The text of the story should have an elementary school readability level.
 - You may check the readability level of your text by using a web tool, such as the one found at this <u>link</u>.
- 5. Your book should have a front and back cover. Remember your audience (elementary school students) and ensure that it is appealing to them.
- 6. You must have an "About the Author/Illustrator" section. At minimum, this should be at least one paragraph.
- 7. Please list your sources in MLA format on the very last page of your book. At <u>minimum</u> you need to use at least 2 different secondary sources. Please feel free to also include a primary source.
