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OTV's Founder first feature-film is a meditation on Black Queer Love and the Pursuit of Joy

THANDO follows a South African Black queer couple fall in and out of reality, love and more.

JOHANNESBURG, SOUTH AFRICA - *THANDO* opens with a quote by the beloved writer, James Baldwin: "Love him and let him love you. Do you think anything else under heaven really matters?" From the self-proclaimed "popstar" and Co-Founder of the Emmy-nominated web TV platform <u>OTV - Open Television</u>, Elijah McKinnon comes *THANDO*. The upcoming feature-length films examines the ways Black Queer love manifests in a society steeped in shame, masclusinity and homophobia. It will make its debut at a soon-to-be announced international film festival this summer.

THANDO is a love letter filled with affirmations for Black LGBTQ+ people all over the world that continue to be misrepresented in mainstream media, under attack in their own bodies and forced to wear a cloak of shame. Through this film, directed by the South African award-winning Director, Twiggy Matiwana (The Bicyle Man), THANDO creates a portal for two queer, African lovers to co-exists in a world that is fuled by their pursuit of collective joy instead of shared traumas.

"Mainstream media and white supremacy have waged a war on Black love; a war whose casualties have impacted the ways in which Black LGBTQ+ people have had to internalize shame around their identity and desires," says McKinnon, writer and film creator. The film was produced in February 2020, before the onset of a global pandemic that has claimed the lives of over 2 million people, with a crew of all Black, LGBTQ+ identified individuals. It follows Reza, a non-biniary performance artist from a township in Soweto and Mase, a writer struggling to understand his identity. Through their brief introduction they suddenly begin to reveal intimate vulnerabilities that both aren't prepared to confront. As they fall in and out of reality, both discover the endless opportunities to create uninhibited joy out of their past traumas.

"THANDO invites our viewers to look at the ways masculinity and hegemony have contributed to the erasure of Black LGBTQ+ love stories," says Matiwana. "It also asks us to imagine a world where Black queer love is universally celebrated and protected."

In observance and celebration of Black History Month, the cast and crew are hosting a limited time preview of the film on <u>Valentine's Day via OTV's recently launched app.</u> This exclusive Director's cut will be livestreamed on Sunday, February 14 at 1 pm CT / 9pm SAST. Following the film will be a conversation on the power of universal Black LGBTQ+ love via Clubhouse, facilitated by Elijah McKinnon and co-hosted by Black LGBTQ+ couples from the United States; Germany, London, Kenya, South Africa and more. Additionally, McKinnon has partnered with <u>PrEP4Love</u>, an internationally acclaimed HIV prevention campaign to host a weekly IG LIVE series during the month of February on "Black Love" featuring anti oppression consultant, <u>McKensie Mack;</u> award-winning queer photographer, <u>Paul Octavious</u> and more.
