



The Foundation Analogy:

אלה as the Eternal Programmer

Imagine אלה as the ultimate Creator — the ONE who made the heavens and the earth — not a human craftsman, but a Divine Programmer. Before anything existed, He created a perfect **code** for all creation. Within that code were the structures, physics, formulas, genetics, principles, and laws that govern all things.
