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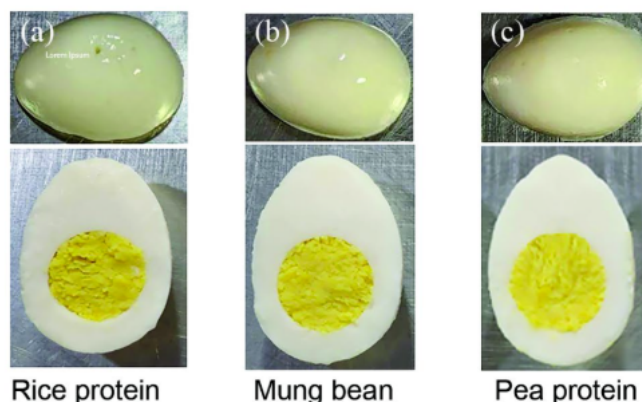


Figure x Visual comparison of whole and halved plant-based hard-boiled eggs prepared using different protein sources: (a) rice, (b) mung bean, (c) pea.

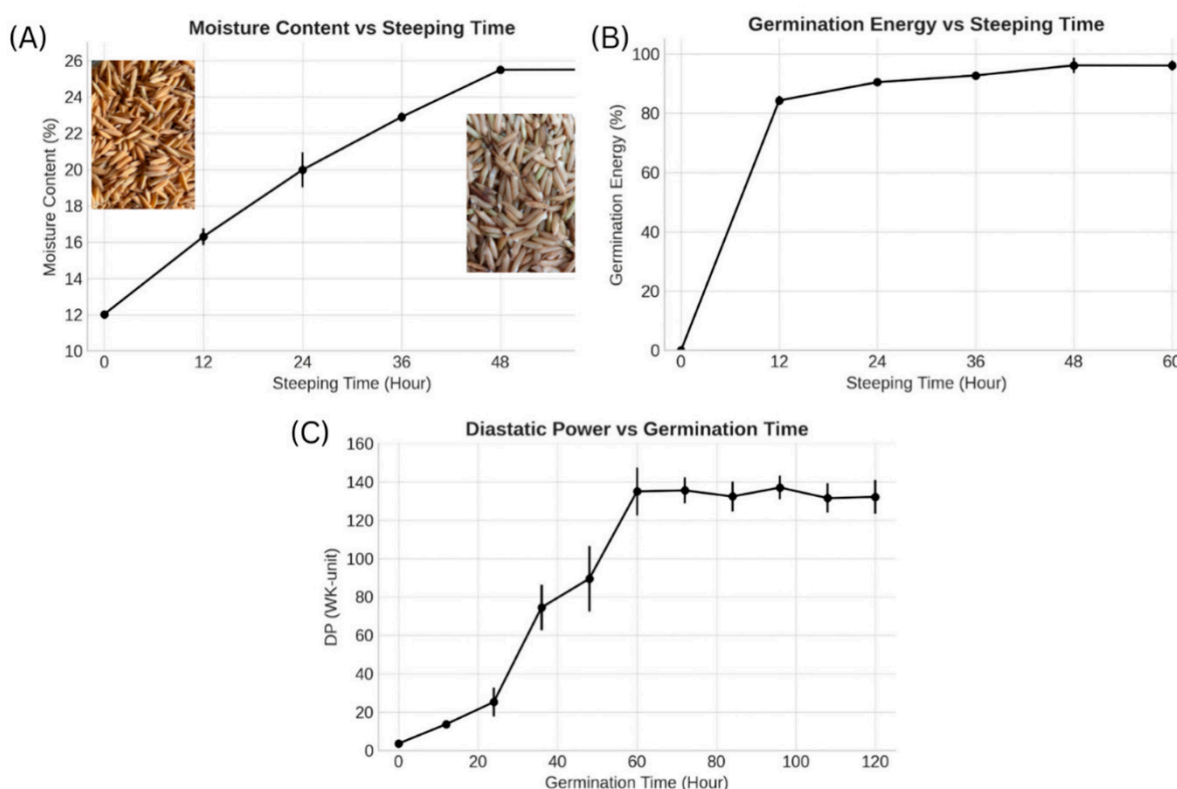
