The African Studies certificate allows students to explore themes related to the continent's history, politics, people, economy, and culture from a multidisciplinary perspective.

The certificate may be earned simultaneously with a B.A. or B.S. degree, or post-baccalaureate. Requirements for the Certificate in African Studies include 24 credits of courses focusing on the region. Students who meet PSU's Second Language B.A./M.A. Requirement will be automatically considered as having completed 4 out of the 24 elective credits required for the Certificate. All courses below must be passed with a "C" or better to satisfy International & Global Studies certificate requirements.

Six upper-division courses (300 or 400 level) are required from this <u>pre-approved course list</u>.

ADVISING

It is recommended that you meet with a faculty advisor or pathway advisor at least once a year (you are welcome to check in every term!). After your first meeting with a <u>pathway advisor</u> you should schedule a meeting with a faculty member who specializes in your region of focus: **for African Studies the faculty advisor is <u>Dr. Priya Kapoor</u>**. Your meeting with the faculty advisor should take place before the end of your junior year to make sure you are on track for graduation.

Applications for a March graduation are due in September, for a June graduation in January, and for an August graduation in April.
