- -Jesse Owens started running when he was only 13 years old
- -He started his athletic career in high school in 1928 and was like a machine. He set multiple world records in track and field in high school and ran perfectly.
- -He died on March 31 1980 due to complications with his lung cancer.

- -He was the first person in the history of the Olympics to win 4 gold medals in 1 time.

-During a time of segregation and also the rise of Nazi Germany, Jesse Owens rebuked Hitlers race theory.
