Welcome & Opening Ritual: 10min

*** **Welcome:** 5min ***

Gather the group. Invite people to gather in-person or online. Share any space, tech or accessibility information.

Share & Invite: Put up Community Covenant ~ Brit. Invite additions & access requests.

Community Covenant ~ Brit

- Listen to understand. Try on different ways of knowing (mind, heart, spirit).
- Take care of yourself! Take breaks as you need.
- Speak from your own experience. Use "I statements".
- Take space; Make space. Notice and adjust your contributions.
- What's said here stays here; What's learned here leaves here.
- Affirm disagreement. Avoid shame & blame.
- Cultivate awareness of both impact and intent.
- We are all teachers and all learners. Get curious. Take risks.

*** Opening Ritual: 5 minutes ***

Welcome your group to a moment of kavannah, intention, together.

→ Press pause: by 0:10 to keep this visual on screen. https://vimeo.com/665795009/0f9aa6f8cf



Ask participants to take three breaths or ground themselves.

Share: In Measuring Love in the Journey for Justice, Shiree Teng & Sammy Nunez teach that there are three ways of knowing in our bodies: in mind, heart, and spirit.

Invite: Take a moment to focus your Kavannah, your intention, on one way of knowing you would like to pay attention to in our learning today. I will bring us back together in a moment.

→ **Press Play:** to proceed to Torah Blessing



→ **Press pause**: to keep Torah Study blessing on screen

Share: Our tradition teaches that the Torah contains both the words written on the Torah scroll and our oral tradition. We received the Torah at Sinai. And we receive Torah through on-going relationship, study and conversation. We have gathered to study the Torah of our Teachers at the Reconstructionist Day of Learning on Reparations. Together we bless this opportunity for learning and connection.

Share: Today we are learning from these valued members of our community...

Invite: Invite a participant to read the Torah Study blessing for the group and/or lead the group in reading. At the – you can add your preferred God-word (Adonai, Havaya, Shechina, Yah).

→ **Press Play:** to proceed to Learning from Our Teachers

Learning from Our Teachers: 45min

Note for Facilitator: This section has **35 minutes of video content** and **10 minutes for reflection**. There are four prompts for reflection. If you spend more time on one, you can make the other moments a bit briefer. The goal is for participants to digest, to draw personal connections to the content, and to engage as a group at least once. Ask participants to focus on sharing one brief thought or taking time to record for themselves one reflection.

If you are in-person this can be an opportunity to:

- turn to a neighbor to share a thought
- invite 2-3 people to share with the whole group

If you are on Zoom this can be a moment for people to:

- do personal reflection
- share in the chat or out loud
- → Press Pause: Reflection Prompt #1, @ 6:55

Invite: participants to reflect on how land ownership as part of a system of racial advantage and disadvantage connects with their lives.

Invite: participants to notice what this learning brings up in mind (binah), heart (lev) & spirit (nefesh).



→ Press Pause: Reflection Prompt #2, @ 17:40

Invite: participants to reflect on how the New Deal and Creation of the White Middle class as part of a system of racial advantage and disadvantage connects with their lives.

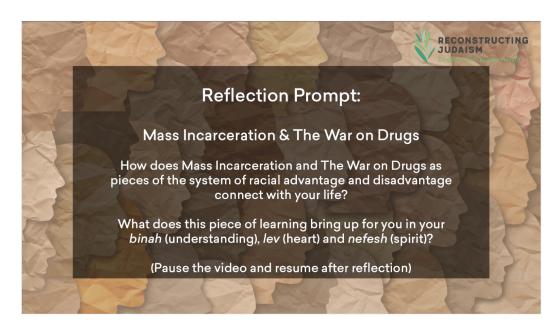
Invite: participants to notice what this learning brings up in mind (binah), heart (lev) & spirit (nefesh).



→ Press Pause: Reflection Prompt #3, @ 27:50

Invite: participants to reflect on how land ownership as part of a system of racial advantage and disadvantage connects with their lives.

Invite: participants to notice what this learning brings up in mind (binah), heart (lev) & spirit (nefesh).



→ Press Pause: Reflection Prompt #3, @ 33:50

Invite: participants to reflect on "why not". This may be an uncomfortable question. In seeking to learn we are also seeking to learn what barriers exist, within ourselves and within our societal narratives, in order to face them and reconstruct a more just world. Ask people to share OR save to bring into their chevrutah conversations in the next section.



 \rightarrow **Pause:** for a one minute mind & body break @ 34:00.

Chevrutah & Text Study: 25min

Facilitator Note: This section contains 3 minutes of video introducing the texts we will be studying from our teachers, a quick 1 min grounding all group prompt in the middle of the video and then 15 minutes for study in chevrutah pairs, followed by 5 minutes for sharing back.

→ Press Pause: Reflection Prompt @ 34:30

Invite participants to share in the chat (Zoom) or in a go-round (in-person) how they would finish this statement in ONE word or phrase.



→ Press Pause: Text Study @ 37:40

Invite participants into pairs for 15 minutes. You can assign randomly in break-out rooms (Zoom) or have people turn to the person next to them or find someone they don't know (in-person).

- Learning in chevrutah is a Jewish practice studying text with one other person to deepen your reflection, curiosity and engagement with a text.
- Choose 1-2 texts to read and discuss using the guided questions.
- Share time and ask each other questions to deepen your learning together.

Invite participants to share one highlight of their reflection in their chevrutah during 5 minutes of all group time. You probably have time for 3-5 brief reflections. Modification: put in the chat and read them.

→ Press Play: to move into the closing ritual

Closing Ritual: 10min

Invite: participants to take a moment for personal reflection on the closing questions.

There is a Jewish practice of dedicating our learning to someone to honor their teaching, their importance in our lives or their memory.

Record: assign a scribe to record the answers (without names attached). We are writing together an on-going Torah of our Learning on Reparations as a Reconstructionist Movement. You are learning alongside a cohort of other congregations. We are recording and sharing to honor this learning, so it may spark more learning and support our collective transformation.

Questions:

- Where would you like to cultivate further learning in the three realms of understanding we have been focusing on: mind (binah), heart (lev) & spirit (nefesh)
- Who would you like to dedicate your on-going learning on reparations to in the coming weeks?



Ice-Breakers & Community Building

Go-Round: What brought you to this community? Or, what has been meaningful for you in being part of this community?

Pair & Share: Break into pairs, take 3min each to share.

(Suggestion: Use one question a session)

- What brought you to this community? Or, what has been meaningful for you in being part of this community?
- Why did you join this group? What is your personal connection to Reparations?
- What is a time that you had a transformative learning experience, either as the learner or the teacher? What made that transformative experience possible?
- Who is someone whose memory, work, or presence in your life you would like to honor with your learning today? Tell me about them!
- What resources are you bringing into our collective work for transformation, justice & repair? What resources do you need to stay in our work alongside me?

Invite a member of your group each time to give a brief Dvar Torah (words of Torah) reflecting on the Torah Portion from this week.

Invite group members to bring an object or picture which connects them to their desire to be part of learning and/or social justice, and to share a word or two about their object.

Community Covenant ~ Brit

Access Needs:

Facilitator's Tools

Parking Lot or Bike Rack

Keep a running list (on butcher paper or on a GoogleDoc) of important questions, conversations or topics which you don't have time or capacity to explore in the group.

Compost Bin ---> Fertilizer: Compost your guilt & shame into responsibility and action.

Keep a running list of things to "throw into the compost bin" -- especially guilt and shame.

Towards the end of each session, take a few minutes to brainstorm a matching list of "fertilizer" items for action and taking responsibility.

Pair & Share

Great to use if you're finding it challenging to facilitate the whole group in conversation on something, need a moment to re-ground as facilitator or think there is way more to be said that can be said in the group. Invite people to turn to the person beside them to share! You can ask the pairs to share anything meaningful that came up if you'd like.

Group Agreements

You can always re-ground in the group agreements to support the group in staying accountable and connected to each other. Take a moment to remind or share an agreement that people may be forgetting about or having challenges putting into practice.

Grounding Practices

In between sessions or if the group could use some support grounding, you can invite people to take a moment for some grounding practices. Examples:

- Put your feet on the floor and take 10 deep breaths.
- Stretch break! Ask someone to lead.
- Niggun or Call & Response. Share or ask someone to lead a song.
- Appreciations: Ask for a few appreciations from the last conversation.

Text Study Sheet

Learning in chevrutah is a Jewish practice studying text with one other person to deepen your reflection, curiosity and engagement with a text. Share time and ask each other questions to deepen your learning together.

Choose one section below which you all are interested in focusing on in your chevrutah pair.

#1: Exodus & Reparations

#2: Talmudic Liability & Collective Action

#3: Communal Responsibility & Al Chet

#1: Exodus & Reparations

Exodus 12:35-36

וּבְנֵי־יִשְׂרָאֵל עֲשָׂוּ כִּדָבַר מֹשָׁה וַיַּשְׁאֲלוֹ מִמְּצְרַיִם כְּלֵי־כֵסֶף וּכָלִי זַהַב וּשְּׁמַלֹת:

The Israelites had done Moses' bidding and borrowed from the Egyptians objects of silver and gold, and clothing.

{וְיִהוָּה נָתַּן אֶת־חֵן הָעָם בְּעִינֵי מִצְרַיִם וַיַּשְׁאִלָוּם וַיְנַצְּלָוּ אֶת־מִצְרְיִם: {פּ

And the LORD had disposed the Egyptians favorably toward the people, and they let them have their request; thus they stripped the Egyptians.

Reflection Prompts:

- What questions do you have about this text? Try to list as many as you can.
- What words stick out to you in this text?
- Who is acting in this text? Who is the subject of the sentences? Whose actions move forward the story?
- What reasons might there be for silver, gold and clothing being the items named specifically?
- How, if at all, have you heard this a portion of the Exodus story talked about?

We will return to this text in a few sessions, so note any questions for deeper wrestling.

#2: Talmudic Liability & Collective Action

Mishnah Bava Kamma 8:1

הַחוֹבֵל בַּחֲבֵירוֹ חַיַּב עַלַיו מִשּׁוּם חֲמִשָּׁה דְבַרִים, בְּנֵזֶק, בְּצַעַר, בְּרָפּוּי, בְּשֶׁבֵת, וּבְבוֹשֶׁת.

One who injures their neighbor is liable to them for these five things: injury, pain, healing, loss of livelihood, and humiliation.

"We all have some involvement even if it's passive. What are the things that we can do to change the world? To change the country? To change the social injustices around race. I think that reparations speaks to that and can do a bit of healing"

Reflection Prompts:

- What relationship do you see between these two texts and the Exodus passage?
- How is passive involvement addressed in the Talmud text on Harm & Liability?
- Where in these texts do you see the concept of healing being addressed?
- What has healing looked like for you in your own life?

#3: Communal Responsibility & Al Chet

Lazora Jordan, LSW, Reconstructionist Day of Learning 5782

Reparations is a mitzvah. Not a good deed, but a Torah commandment.

Pirkei Avot 2:16

לא עָלֶיךְ הַמְּלָאכָה לִגְמֹר, וְלֹא אַתָּה בֶּן חוֹרִין לִבָּטֵל מִמֶּנָה. It is not upon us to complete the work but neither are we free to abandon it.

Reflection Prompts:

- What role do mitzvot play in your personal life? In this community's collective life?
- What does Pirkei Avot add to your understanding of mitzvot as commandments?
- Where have you or communities you are part of gotten stuck on the spectrum of completing the work or abandoning it? Unstuck? What has made that possible?

Shulchan Aruch, Orach Chayim 607

That which we say, the Al Chet prayer, does not specify the person's specific sin. Everyone says it equally according to the nusach of the prayer.

Al chet... is a communal prayer. We are praying individually for things we may not have done, but we still hold responsibility for as a community, because we live in a world where we have let these things happen in one way or another.

I know that there is some pushback against the idea of reparations for black people. And I would ask people to look into themselves and say, "why not?". To look into the history, to understand that the history we've laid out which is just scratching the surface is a history that is still playing out today.

Reflection Prompts:

- What does Lazora's lifting up of Al Chet as a communal prayer and model of collective responsibility add to this conversation?
- What is your relationship with the Al Chet liturgy: the collective prayer of taking responsibility for wrongs we have done in the past year?
- Where have you seen communal responsibility play out in-practice?
- Take a minute to share any "why nots" that came up for you. How might these texts address these "why nots"?
