At the end of the paragraph, the author should end the study with a comment on the significance concerning the identification of the issue and objective of the research. This section also describes the author's position among a number of existing pieces of literature to show the novelty that will be discussed.

The method is written in descriptive form and should provide a statement regarding the research methodology. The method and theory used should be written as concisely as possible so the reader can understand clearly.

This section is the most critical section of your article. The analysis or results of research should be clear and based on research and/or literature research. ## **Bibliography**
