Situated geographically –and metaphorically?—between Ann Arbor and Detroit, this year’s TYCA MW location—[Livonia](#)—asks us to explore productive and unproductive tensions in our work—how we teach, how we measure learning, assumptions and mandates related to our teaching, and how we engage in a pernicious industry of “more.” Livonia is recognized as one of the 25 safest cities in America and features a workforce as diverse as any urban city in the US.
