## **News from the Middle School Counselor**



Hello Middle School Parents!

During my time as a Middle School counselor, I have noticed times when students have the ability to perform well in school, but sometimes lack the confidence to thrive. This week, I would like to help provide parents with some tips on helping your children reach their full potential.

- 1) Take time to talk with your child about what motivates them. What motivates them on an intrinsic or extrinsic level? Ask them what they look forward to doing. Ask them which activities make them feel energized. If they don't have anything that makes them feel motivated, ask them to take some time and think about the things that make them feel good. Try to help them see the connection between what they're learning in school, and to what makes them feel energized or motivated.
- 2) Help your child stay positive! School (and life, of course) has many ups and downs. Sometimes students may get discouraged if they perform poorly

on an exam or miss a homework assignment. That's ok! It's ok to make mistakes. It's our hope that students learn from their mistakes and always continue moving forward. One thing students can do is imagine they were giving their friend advice after experiencing some sort of set back, and then taking their own advice - this helps create positive self-talk.

- 3) Help your child understand that it is best to compare themselves with themselves, rather than comparing themselves with others. Students can set their own personal goals, and work towards those goals. Then they can chart and see how well they're doing at reaching the goals they set for themselves.
- 4) Help your child verbalize and visualize their goals. By getting them to say their goals out loud, or by writing them down, they are already one step closer towards reaching those goals. If your goals are not written down, and if nobody knows them, it's a lot easier to fall short of them or to give up on yourself. But if others know your goals, it's easier to hold yourself accountable for them.
- 5) Ask your child to surround themselves with positive people! Negative people and influences can very easily bring us down, while positive influences and positive people can easily pull us up!

If you're able to take time to review this with your child, I'm hoping it helps bring out the best in them! Our students are all very capable of achieving success in whatever it is they set their minds to! Sometimes it just takes a little extra support to help us take that next step forward.

## Instrumental Music

Greetings Musicians and Parents,

As you already know, all music classes must follow specific guidelines for pandemic control. These guidelines are informed by health professionals and also informed by science research in aerosol emissions by major universities and professional orchestras around the world.

Several key requirements for our specific music classes include:

- Class sizes are limited to 25 students in any room at one time. Some large band classes will seat students in practice rooms during the period.
- Every student must wear their face mask 100% of the time during classes, between classes, in classrooms and in hallways.
- Students will be spaced around the room as far apart as possible. Please respect the assigned seating.
- Students may pull their mask down to blow notes on a wind instrument, and must pull their mask up when their notes are finished.
- Face masks must remain in the fully-covered position during all singing, talking, and while playing non-wind instruments such as guitars, keyboards, and percussion.
- Music classes with wind instruments or singers will take a ten-minute break after every 30 minutes of playing to allow the ventilation systems to clear the air in the room.
- Practice rooms may only contain one wind instrument or singer. Practice rooms may only contain two non-wind instruments. After 30 minutes of use, every practice room must be aired out for ten minutes before next use.

Section 5.4-2 (page 29) of the Student Parent Handbook (Uniform and Appearance) regarding hair color:

Hairstyles, if considered inappropriate for students in a school setting, will not be allowed. Hair, even if colored, should be of natural hair color or hue.

Thank you all very much for your patience, understanding and support as we try to navigate these wild waters together.



Dear Middle School Parents.

Oh what a month we have had! Online learning is not the best for PE, but we have managed to keep the students engaged with activities at home for the fitness unit, also allowing them to learn about some of the most famous fitness channels on youtube, as well as relevant PE teachers that have been doing PE at home since the pandemic started.



As we approach the end of the fitness unit, we are adjusting the activities so that they are suitable for being done with a mask on, as it is required these days, so we have moved away from cardiovascular work and focusing more on muscle strength. This has raised some interesting questions from the students: "Why does my tummy hurt?" asked one last week two days after an intense session of standing long jumps. Good question!

This will be our last week of fitness, and we will start our Swimming Unit on February the 15th. This decision has not been taken lightly, as we have considered the circumstances around the covid situation and thought that swimming is a safer option than team sports or any other group activity, as demonstrated by the fact that swimming pools are now allowed to open and operate all over Bangkok. We will carefully manage all the procedures regarding access to the pool and occupancy of the changing rooms in order to reduce close contact. Also, be reminded that Swimming is a mandatory part of the curriculum and that students are required to participate, which will be reflected in their participation grade as defined in the PE Course Syllabus.

In order to be prepared for swimming lessons, students need to bring the following: swimsuit, towel, goggles, and swim cap.







## Middle School Math Pathways

For math in middle school, we offer Pre-Algebra in Grade 7. In order to move to Algebra 1 in Grade 8 students must score 80% or higher in both Semesters. Alternatively, students can be placed in Algebra 1 in Grade 8 if they score 70-79% for a class average and pass a cumulative exam with a mark of 80% or above. Any Grade 7 student who does not meet these conditions must take Pre-Algebra Part 2 in Grade 8. For Grade 6, any student who does not have 80% or above for a yearly average will take Pre-Algebra Part 1 in Grade 7 and Pre-Algebra Part 2 in Grade 8.

To maintain student and teacher safety, campus is closed to food deliveries (for everyone). Plan to bring everything with you in the morning.

Parents/visitors who wish to enter campus are asked to schedule an appointment through the registrar.

- Masks must be worn at all times, including the classroom.
- Students' temperature is checked upon entrance.
- Late students must check in <u>with the Registrar</u> to receive an "Admit to Class" slip. The registrar is located in the main lobby of the middle school.
- Students must use hand-sanitizer before entering school and before entering each classroom.

- Students must sanitize any shared classroom materials/supplies after each use.
- Students sanitize their desks before leaving from every class, with the provided supplies.
- Students must remain socially distant at all times.
- No more than 4 students in the restroom at any given time.
- Students may take their backpacks into their classroom for each block to avoid groups at the lockers.
- MS Students have a 20 minute transition period between classes.
- Students may wear a face shield <u>as well as a mask</u> but not instead of a mask.
- Lunch (Students' temperature is checked upon entrance to the canteen before lunch.



Students in grades 5-8 use the Accelerated Reader program to track their reading comprehension skills and obtain points based on the books they read each quarter. Accelerated Reader is a software tool that allows students to select their own book and then assess whether a student has completed reading the book by asking a

series of questions. We keep track of this each quarter and have a big party at the end of the year. Accelerated Reader is administered by the English Department under the direction of Mr. Ted, our Curriculum Coordinator and Head of English. Students in each grade are required to read independent novels and get points each quarter.

## **Student Computers**

The Faculty and Administration believe technology is a powerful and integral part of the TCIS instructional program. While there are many good computers on the market, please understand that the TCIS High School requires MacBooks for all students.

1) **TCIS High School** is a MacBook one-to-one school - MacBooks are required for all grade 9 through 12 students



## 2) TCIS Middle School

- a) MacBooks are recommended for grades 7 & 8 students.
  - i) A Chromebook is acceptable (remember a MacBook is required for grades 9-12)
- b) School owned Chromebooks are provided for grades 5 & 6 students.
- c) All students in Grades 5-8 need access to a computer at their home. Students will be using Google Classroom and various websites for school work. We do recommend a laptop but any computer for home use is fine. iPads and tables are acceptable but have some limitations. Windows-based computers are fine for home use as well but are not allowed on the school network.



# T.R.A.A.P. METHOD

## TIMELINESS

When was the information published or updated? Does your topic require current information?





## RELEVANCE

Does the information answer your main question? Does the information meet the stated requirements for the assignment?



## AUTHORITY

Who is the author? What are the author's credentials? Is the author affiliated with an educational institution or other organization? Do other books cite the author?



## ACCURACY

Are there statements you know to be false? What citations or references support the author's claim? What do other people have to say about the topic?



## PURPOSE

Is the author's purpose to sell, persuade, entertain, or inform? Is there an obvious bias? Are other points of view expressed?

## **Excused Absences**

For an Absence to be Excused, a parent must email/call in the absence within 24 hours. The reason for the absence must be supported by the factors outlined in the attendance policy:

- Illness with medical documentation
- observation or celebration of a religious holiday
- recovery from accident with medical documentation
- required court attendance with court notice
- death in the family
- other absences that may be deemed acceptable by the Head of Schools or Designee

If a parent does not email/call in the absence, the student is marked as absent without excuse.

## **Birthday Cupcake Procedures and No Food Deliveries Policy**



At TCIS, we understand that children and parents wish to celebrate birthdays with classmates. It is a big day! While we do allow children to bring in cupcakes to share with classmates, we do have procedures in place that need to be followed.

Please note, no soda, no full birthday cakes, or candles are allowed, as it takes too much time for us to cut and distribute cake to students and to clean up. Of course, candles are dangerous and present a serious fire risk.

## These steps need to be followed:

- The cupcakes must come to school with the student when he/she arrives at school.
   Deliveries are not allowed under any circumstances.
- The cupcake will be given to Ms. Ooy or Dr. Michael in the morning and kept their office
- Do not provide any knives to your child to cut the cupcakes.
- Cupcakes will be distributed only lunch time by the student
- No loss of class instructional time will be allowed due to the celebration

## No Food Deliveries Allowed

No food deliveries are allowed to TCIS at any time during the school day. If a student forgot his/her lunch, do not worry, we will make sure to take care of them on that day. However, please do make sure your child has money on his/her card to use in the canteen.
