The World Council of Churches observes the yearly **Season of Creation** from Sept.1-Oct. 4 (the feast of St. Francis). It is a special time when we celebrate God as Creator and acknowledge Creation a precious gift to us.

How can you help take care of God's creation? Here are a few ideas you can do at home:

- Plant pollinator-friendly flowers in your yard
- Use fewer pesticides
- Dim the outside lights at your home overnight. It helps the plants, pollinators and wildlife
- Mixed recyclables can go into your bin. This includes-paper, cardboard, plastic bottles, metal cans and foil
- Plastic bags, plastic film, bubble wrap can be put in bins at Walmart,
  Target, Aldi and others. Do not put in with mixed recyclables
- Used batteries and ink cartridges can be brought to Staples and you can receive money back
- Used office technology can be brought to Staples
