Discussion Questions, Anne Bradstreet, "The Author To Her Book" English IV, Carty

- 1. In this poem, the speaker refers to her book as "offspring of her feeble brain," a "rambling brat." What does this metaphor suggest about the connection that the speaker has with her writing?
- 2. The book that Bradstreet is most likely referring to here is a collection of her poems called "The Tenth Muse." This collection was brought to London by Bradstreet's brother-in-law, who printed and published it without first telling Bradstreet. Based on the one Bradstreet poem that you've read, do you imagine that her "The Tenth Muse" is "the offspring of a feeble brain," "unfit for light"? Explain.
- 3. Do you suspect that the feelings expressed in "The Author to Her Book" are legitimate, or are they just false humility? Explain.
- 4. Comment on the line "I wash'd thy face, but more defects I saw." What might the speaker mean by this? How might it be a metaphor for touching up a work of art?
- 5. Author Zadie Smith advises writers to "resign [themselves] to the lifelong sadness that comes from never being satisfied." Is there something inherently sad about the publication part of the writing process?
- 6. Does Bradstreet express this sadness in her poem? Explain.
