<u>Flipgrid</u>	Flipgrid is a social learning platform where students record short video responses to questions, such as a reading response question. The students can then reply to each other's videos if you allow them to, creating a classroom discussion.	Web, iOS, A	All
Google Classroom Question	One of Google Classroom's assignment options is a question. The teacher can ask a question and students write a response. Then, they can respond to one another if you allow them to, creating a class discussion.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up
Digital Discussion Platform (<u>Padlet</u>)	Students can collaborate on beautiful discussion boards and add photos, text & much more. Padlet also integrates with Google Classroom.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up
Collaborative Digital Journal (Google Slides, etc.)	As a class, you can create a collaborative journal responding to questions, reflecting on themes, analyzing characters, etc. For example, each student could be assigned a character to analyze, then students could comment on and add to each other's work in a collaborative journal in Slides. Podcasting (<u>Anchor</u>)	Podcasting allows students to reflect on a book or topic and share their learning with others. If all or many students created a podcast, they could be put together into a podcast series and published for others to listen to.	iOS, A	2nd & up
Social Media Response (i.e. <u>Twitter, Instagram,</u> <u>Kudos</u>)	Use a safe, kid-friendly version of a social media site (like Instagram's kid-friendly version, Kudos) or actual social media for older kids to have students respond to their reading. Book Commercial / Summary (iMovie, Adobe Spark, Powtoon, etc.)	Students can create video book commercials or summaries to "advertise" the book they read. They can share the video with classmates to encourage them to read the book.	[Depends on Digital Tool]	All
<u>Flipgrid</u>	Flipgrid is a social learning platform where students record short videos. They could record videos as mini book talks / book reports, then (if you allow them to) reply to one another's videos.	Web, iOS, A	All
Podcasting (<u>Anchor</u>)	Podcasting allows students to reflect on a book or topic and share their learning with others. If all or many students created a podcast, they could be put together into a podcast series and published for others to listen to.	iOS, A	2nd & up
Create-a-Quiz (Kahoot!, Quizizz, Quizalize, Quizlet)	Students create their own quiz over the book or chapters they read. If the whole class or other students also read it, the other students can play the quiz or use it to study.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up

"Quiz Show" Chapter Quizzes (Kahoot!, Quizizz, Quizalize, Quizlet)	Instead of regular paper-and-pencil quizzes to make sure students read and understood the section, make quizzes fun and competitive by taking them online. Use a game-show style quiz program to quiz students and get a grade in an interactive way.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up
Google Lit Trips	Take an interactive journey in the shoes of the character(s) with Google Lit Trips. These trips take students into the character's journey in Google Earth while providing supplementary media, information and discussion-starters to create relevant and engaging literary experiences. Literature Circles 2.0	The term "lit circles 2.0" encompasses a variety of techniques to bring traditional literature circles into the 21st century. Whether students use Padlet to collaborate on a discussion board, discuss the book with their group on Flipgrid, or collaborate on a presentation or Google Site about their book, there are lots of great ways to take literature circles to the next level with tech tools. Digital Graphic Organizers (<u>Popplet</u> , <u>Google</u> <u>Drawings</u> , etc.)	Digital graphic organizers are a great way to organize thoughts, pre-write, or demonstrate understanding. Students can create concept maps, flow charts, venn diagrams, or various other graphic organizers digitally to make them neater and easier to share, present, turn into outline form, etc.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up
Face Talker (<u>Blabberize</u> , <u>Chatterpix</u> , etc.)	Fun "face talkers" make a picture come to life as if it's talking. "Quiz Show" Quizzes (<u>Kahoot!</u> , Quizizz, Quizalize, Quizlet)	Instead of regular paper-and-pencil quizzes to practice or test spelling or vocabulary words, make quizzes fun and competitive by taking them online. Use a game-show style quiz program to quiz students and get a grade (or just practice) in an interactive way.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up
<u>Flippity</u>	Use Flippity to create fun activities like Mad Libs, word searches, word scrambles, crossword puzzles, hangman, memory games, and more.	Web	All
Google Forms Spelling/Vocab Quiz	Never grade a spelling or vocab quiz again! Use Google Forms self-grading quizzes to have your students test over their words. They get immediate feedback on their answers; you don't have to grade!	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up

Writing

<u>Digital Tool / Idea</u>	How to Use It	<u>Platforms</u>	Grade Levels
Google Docs	An "oldie but goodie," Google Docs is a word-processing tool that also keeps track of all changes that have been made (and allows you to go back and see the revision history), comment on others' text when the Doc is shared, and even mark up the text like you would with a pen for correcting. It's especially great for collaborative writing, because students can work together on the same Doc in real time.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up
Google Slides Digital Journal	Students can create digital journals / interactive notebooks using Google Slides. They can write responses, summaries, or short stories. The teacher can interact with the student within the journal by adding comments, making suggestions, etc. Google Drawings, which allows you to create graphic organizers, can also be inserted onto the Slides. Collaborative class journaling can also be done by sharing the Slides with everyone.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up
Google Blogger	Blogger is an easy, built-in-to-Google tool for creating blogs. Students can blog, then share their blogs with one another and an authentic audience online.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up

Reading Fluency

Digital Tool / Idea	How to Use It	<u>Platforms</u>	Grade Levels
Voice Recorder (<u>Voice Memos</u> , <u>Mic Note</u> , etc.)	Using a voice recording app or extension, students can record themselves reading aloud a passage or book. These recordings can be listened to later by a teacher to assess fluency, and also saved and compared with later recordings to monitor progress, share with parents, etc.	[Depends on Digital Tool]	All
<u>Flipgrid</u>	Flipgrid is a social learning platform where students record short videos. Flipgrid is a great tool that can be used to practice reading aloud independently in a fun way that the teacher can view later to assess for fluency.	Web, iOS, A	All
Face Talker (<u>Blabberize</u> , <u>Chatterpix</u> , etc.)	Fun "face talkers" make a picture come to life as if it's talking. Biblionasium	Free site allows teachers to create student "social reading" accounts (they can even log in with Destiny!). The reading log feature allows students to track reading time and comment on books they read (younger students could do this with parent help). Parents can create accounts as well, and both parents and teachers can set reading challenges and rewards for students.	Web	All
Reading Rewards	Online reading log and reading incentive program that includes social reading features. Create reading challenges, track student reading & let students recommend books to others.	Web, iOS	All
Google Slides Digital Journal	Students can create digital journals of what they read using Google Slides. Each day or week, they can add responses or summaries of what they have read. The teacher can interact with the student within the journal by adding comments, suggesting books, etc.	Web, iOS, A	2nd & up
Google Forms Digital Reading Log	Students can fill out their Reading Log digitally using Google Forms (younger kids could have parent help), then the results for all your students will automatically populate in a Google Sheet for you to review.
