

CCA Data Collection Questionnaire - Long (India)

India has several examples of community-based conservation where deep connections exist between an area and the local community, usually rooted in history, socio-cultural identity, spirituality and/or people's reliance on the area for their livelihood and wellbeing. Community based conservation practices also exist in non-traditional and urban areas. In India, such areas are referred to as Community Conserved Areas (CCAs). The three definitive characteristics of a CCA are:

- The community is the main decision maker for the area (even if not legally)
- The community makes and enforces rules and regulations for conservation
- The efforts contribute to the conservation of nature

Note: This questionnaire is also for areas which do not fulfill the above three criteria but desire to do so, or ones where conservation efforts have been disrupted due to poor practices, relocation or restrictive legal policies (see question on category of CCA).

CCAs are not recognised legally in India. However, they are well recognised and supported by global networks and alliances.

What is this information for?

Information submitted using this questionnaire will contribute to a growing body of knowledge on the multiple values of CCAs, including their vital contributions to livelihoods and wellbeing of communities and to the conservation of nature around the world. This information will be put up online on a web portal on CCAs in South Asia and will be available in public domain, meaning that it will be owned by and be accessible to the general public. The person or organisation responding to this questionnaire should ensure that free, prior, informed consent (FPIC) of the community has been obtained for this (see document on FPIC process and accompanying signature form).

How should the questionnaire be used?

The questionnaire should be completed in a participatory manner, in accordance with the customs and governance processes of the community, with input from as many community-members as possible.

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Notes

1. Category of CCA:

A) Defined CCA: A territory that fulfils the 3 criteria for being called a CCA:

- The community is the main decision-maker.
- There are systems, rules and regulations in place for conservation.
- The effort is leading towards conservation.

B) Disrupted CCA: These include:

- A territory under the long-term full control of local communities that is in a poor state of conservation for a variety of influences and conditions that developed outside of their control, but it is possible to be reversed and counteracted.
- A well-conserved territory where communities would like to live sustainably, but have been removed and deprived of management control because of development and conservation initiatives or for other reasons.
- A territory where there is no way of accommodating local communities under existing national legislation and policies (in some cases national legislation does not even acknowledge the existence of “communities”). In such cases, CCAs may somehow exist de facto on the ground and play important roles for biodiversity conservation, but have little long term security.

C) Desired CCA: These could include new or reconstituted communities that decide to pull themselves together in relation to a common environment, socio-ecological principles and vision. In so doing, they develop a common identity for themselves as a “community” and for their territory as a CCA. This could be a pre-existing historical situation or a new one. (An important example of a “desired CCA” may be the new territory of a community relocated onto new land. If, for a variety of reasons, the community decides to accept living in the new territory, it may consciously work to develop the bond with it, along with a form of governing institution and positive practices.)
