Below are the different genres. You may choose any TWO different genres. You can read any TWO books, as long as they are from different genres.

General Fiction Fiction that transcends popular novel categories—mystery, romance or science fiction, [etc.]—is called mainstream fiction.	Historical Fiction A fictional story set in a recognizable period of history. As well as telling the stories of ordinary people's lives, historical fiction may involve political or social events of the time.	Mystery A form of narration in which one or more elements remain unknown or unexplained until the end of the story.
Fantasy Fantasy is a genre of fiction that commonly uses magic and other supernatural phenomena as a primary plot element, theme, or setting.	Science Fiction Science fiction can be defined as literature involving elements of science and technology as a basis for conflict, or as the setting for a story.	Adventure A genre of fiction in which action is the key element, overshadowing characters, theme and setting The conflict in an adventure story is often man against nature.
Biography (non-fiction) an account of someone's life written by someone else	Non-fiction A work in which real events and people are written [about] in novel form, but are not camouflaged as a fictional story.	Memoir (non-fiction) a historical account or biography written from personal knowledge or special sources

What is a one-pager?


A one pager allows students to share their most important takeaways on a single piece of blank paper. Each one pager should have the following elements:


- □ Title and Author
- ☐ Brief summary of the plot of the book (or topic, if non-fiction)
- ☐ Main character description (or if it is a non-fiction book description of a key person or main event)
- ☐ Theme or Author's message & explanation (how is this theme present in the book)
- Symbol (a thing (object, image, etc) that carries a deeper meaning & explanation of how the symbol matters to the book
- One golden line (a quote that stood out to you or made you think something new or different) &
 explanation of why this quote is important in your opinion



The Extraordinaries by TJ Klune

A humorous and heartfelt story about a queer teen who writes fan fiction and dreams of becoming a superhero.

Infinity Son by Adam Silvera

Set in a world where magical powers exist, two brothers find themselves in the middle of a war between spell walkers and specters.

Cemetery Boys by Aiden Thomas

A trans Latinx teen summons a ghost to prove himself a real brujo, leading to unexpected friendship and romance.

Wilder Girls by Rory Power

A gripping tale of survival as a group of girls are quarantined on an island due to a mysterious disease.
