([UNC-Chapel Hill Libraries Catalog](#)) After you search for your topic, use the menu on the left side of the results to limit your search to books that are available online. Choose a book and click on "Full text available via the UNC-Chapel Hill Libraries."

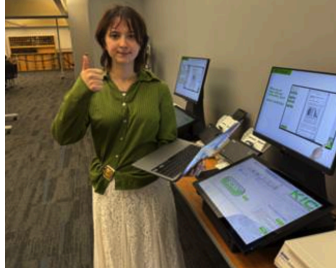

Find one of the scanners (located near the printers) and take a photo of your team member jumping for joy. Make sure to get the scanner in the background!

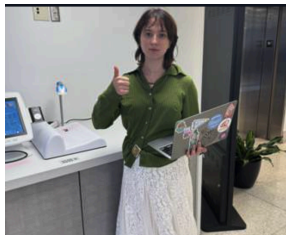


6. Head to the Library Service Desk on the first floor of Davis Library. Ask someone working at the desk what types of equipment and accessories they have available for checkout.

- From library.unc.edu, under **Research Tools**, choose **Citation Help**

12. Follow the link for <https://guides.lib.unc.edu/citing-information>
- Choose "Chicago (notes and bibliography)" as your Citation Style
 - Using the information from the article from **Middle Eastern Studies** that you found above, provide a citation. (You can also use the [Sample Bibliography Page](#) as a model)

13. Library of Congress call numbers make it possible to locate books in the library. They usually consist of several lines of letters and numbers.
- On the first line (Classification Line), letters are filed alphabetically.
 - Numbers to the left of the decimal point are filed as whole numbers and numbers to the right of the decimal point are filed as decimal numbers.
 - On the second line (Cutter Line), letters are filed alphabetically and all the numbers are filed as a decimal number.

In what order would these books be found in the stacks? Use Copy/Paste to move the boxes around and place the call numbers in order.

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14. Use the call number you recorded in the second clue to locate the book in the stacks.

- Head to the elevators in the middle of each floor.
- Inside the elevator, find the sign that tells which floor your call number is on.;

17. A DOI, or Digital Object Identifier, is a string of numbers, letters and symbols used to uniquely identify an article or document. A DOI will help your reader easily locate a document from your citation. Think of it like a Social Security number for the article you're citing — it will always refer to that article, and only that one. While a web address (URL) might change, the DOI will never change.

18. Your search in Articles+ was a little too broad, and you'd like to narrow down your search to a subject specific database.

- a. Go to the library website, library.unc.edu, and underneath **Research and Support**, select **E-Research by Discipline**
- b. Choose **Environmental Studies** to find databases on that subject
- c. Under "Recommended Databases", choose **Environment Complete**
- d. Do a search using your keywords **water AND technology AND "Middle East"**
- e. Scroll through the first two pages of results, scanning the titles as you go
- f. Choose one article that stands out to your group as interesting or particularly relevant and list the DOI below.
