^{***}Dappv is a 5-way vaccine and covers the core vaccinations. Discuss with your vet if your area or lifestyle requires additional vaccinations. Also discuss with your vet about heartworm and flea and tick prevention as well. I prefer heartgard and Bravecto.

Diet and Supplements

Feeding Your Puppy:

Your puppy is eating PawTree dog food (not grain free). We will either tell you what recipe your puppy's litter is being raised on (we rotate recipes) OR we will provide you with enough food to transition to any of the formulas/recipes you choose from PawTree. We have formulated a recipe for our dogs and puppies, our litters are used to eating this and will transition well when fed this recipe. People are always amazed at how great body condition our dogs are in as well as their incredibly shiny coats, it truly helps decrease shedding as well.

Native Corgis Dog Food Recipe: (all our dogs and litters are fed with this recipe)

- -PawTree dog food
- -Soak food in PawTree's pawPairings bone broth (this is essential, kibble is designed to be rehydrated, if not rehydrated your dog will be constantly dehydrated)
- -1 spoonful of canned food is plenty per feeding (we use Life's Abundance Pork and Venison)
- -Fish oil- if you want to really reduce shedding as much as possible, do not skip out on PawTree's Salmon Oil, it's known at liquid gold in the doggy world
- -NuJoint
- -NuVet
- ****Puppies with ears down or not strong ears should be given a calcium supplement or add cottage cheese to each feeding to help strengthen their ears.

If your dog gets an upset stomach at any time, add dehydrated pumpkin and PawTree's Gastro Pro Plus until things improve.

They have been used to eating this food recipe but because of the stress of leaving their mom, they may not eat as well as they have here. They can also get diarrhea during this time. If it persists, you can add dehydrated pumpkin (supplies page) to the food and/or PawTree's Gastro Pro Plus. The pumpkin adds fiber and helps firm up the stools.

Feeding Schedule:

6-12 Weeks:

Feed 3 times a day. Morning, noon, and 5-7 pm. After 5-10 minutes, take up what's left. The goal is to put just enough food in the bowl that they can finish. Feeding this way allows them to adjust the amount they eat as they are growing. Start with ¼ cup of food at each feeding and then adjust accordingly.

3 months old – 1 year old:

Feed 2 times a day. Morning and 5-7 pm. Feed based on weight. Take the total amount the dog food bag recommends and divide it up into the two meals. The dog food bag should be able to show you the recommended amount based on their weight. Again, after 5-10 minutes take up what they did not eat.

1 year:

They can be switched to eating 1 time a day if needed but we prefer and some of our dogs require their meals to be split into two feedings. I prefer to split their total amount of food a day into two and feed breakfast and dinner.

Corgis are prone to becoming fat. This is usually caused by over feeding and low exercise. If this seems to become an issue, make sure you are feeding a food with lower fat and protein percentages and lower the daily feeding amount. Increasing exercise will go a long way as well. Corgis are a herding breed and are capable of being very active. Do not leave out unlimited food 24/7. This is not an appropriate way to feed a dog. Overweight dogs are prone to hip dysplasia, back problems, and a significantly shortened life. Treats and Chews:

Dog treats and chews are CONSTANTLY being recalled. There are so many deaths resulting from bad treats and chews. We are very cautious and buy our dog treats and chews from PawTree, we know their products are carefully made. For bones and chews, we buy the raw bones listed on our supplies page as well as the bully sticks listed and the yak chews. If this is not an option be very careful about which bones and chews you buy. We do not suggest cooked bones, we sometimes send home one cooked bone with our puppies because we cannot send home raw bones but it is not a good long term option (can damage teeth over timeraw bones are easier on teeth).

We make our own training treats by using our current dog food with PawTree's pawPairings seasoning on it. Your puppy has been introduced to this and has been using these during training.

Other Things to Consider:

There are a lot more things that can be added and tailored to each dogs diet. If you have any issues related to diet, allergies, shedding, anxiety, UTIs (common in corgis due to their low stance), tear stains, etc. PLEASE contact me. I have come up with many solutions to all these issues that WORK.





After many, many years of research and testing dog foods we have found our most favorite dog food yet. Not only is the food wonderful but the company and their customer service is not matched anywhere else.

PawTree is not sold in stores. They make their food in small batches and send it directly to your door. This also keeps your pet from eating food that has been sitting on warehouse shelves for years in the heat (yes, the dog food you buy in stores sit on shelves for that long). PawTree also has not had any recalls on their pet foods.

We require all our puppy buyers to continue feeding PawTree's Dog food. It is a great diet for corgis and is balanced for proper growth. We have seen many other diets contribute to improper growth which also leads to joint and bone problems not only later in their life but even in young dogs.

Puppy buyers are encouraged to sign up for EZship. This will save you a lot of money, but also will allow you to forget about it until it arrives at your door. - 4. At checkout you can adjust your EZ Ship frequency to whatever time frame you need. This can be adjusted later.



Corgi Information

What kind of dog is that?

Pembroke Welsh Corgi - The smaller corgi breed. Typically, is the breed that the general public knows about. Typically, they have no tail and have rounded but not as large of ears as cardigans. Standard colors are black and tan (Black tri), fawn, red, and sable. All with or without white. There is also a color called "Bluie" which is the Dilute version of a black tri.

Cardigan Welsh Corgi – The larger corgi breed. Most of the public does not realize there are more than one breed of corgis. Cardigans typically have tails and are bulkier. Cardigans have a lot more variety in their colors. They can come in black, blue merle, brindle, red, brindle merle, "bluie" or dilute, red merle, and sable merle, and liver. All of these colors can be with or without tan and or brindle points and with or without white.

American Corgi – This is the newest of all of the breeds. It is the cross of the Pembroke with the Cardigan. The goal is to have the best of both breeds. Cardigans tend to be very laid back and Pembrokes are known for having high energy. We strive to meet in the middle and create puppies that fit most family's lifestyle. It has yet to be recognized by AKC, but like any breed they must start somewhere. As a breeder, it is important to me to not jeopardize the quality, health, and structure of the dog for color. American Corgis can come in black, blue merle (genetically is called a black merle), "bluie" (dilute) merle, brindle, fawn, sable, red, brindle merle, "bluie" or dilute, Liver merle, sable merle (most breeders are calling this red merle), and liver. All of these colors can be with or without tan and or brindle points and with or without white.

Standard Coats- Corgis standard coat is slicker and shorter hair.


Glamour Coats- Corgis can have what is called a glamour coat. This is a standard coat that may be a little bit fluffier or longer than normal but is not a fluffy.

Fluffy Coats- Corgis can have a fluffy coat that is a longer coat than the standard coat and is also fluffier. A good comparison is it is similar to an Australian Shepherds coat. Their hair is softer instead of a thicker, stiffer hair. Fluffies tend to shed less but need more grooming

Corgis Ears:

When your puppy leaves, their ears can be standing or still floppy; it is normal for them to be either way. If they have not stood up by 10 weeks, I encourage you to up the calcium intake by feeding a spoonful of cottage cheese at each meal. If by 12 weeks of age the ears are still not standing, I highly encourage taping them. If you do not tape them at this point, they may never go up and it becomes harder to get to stand later on. The following image discusses how to tape up ears. I find that masking tape does not stick so I use duck tape instead. You can also help support the ear by adding cut toilet paper rolls to add support and then tape. Once taped I leave on for 4-7 days or until it gets too dirty. I don't change too often because I don't want to irritate the skin but don't leave on if the ears get dirty. When you remove the tape, give the ears a few hours to just relax. If the ears are standing you can try to leave the tape off and see if they stay standing. If the ears are still not standing, retape and continue to do so until they stand on their own. EAR TAPING TIPS FOR CARDIGAN WELSH CORGIS







Taping is used to enhance circulation through the entire ear by eliminating the fold. This encourages cartilage formation at an early age. Corgi ears should never be "rolled" or "racked" like a Dobermans where ¼ of the ear has been cut away. Rolling such a large ear would actually decrease circulation. Taping as illustrated here does not hurt in any way. Your puppy won't like holding still for the process and will probably try to roll, scratch, or shake off the tape. However, they soon forget the tape is there. You can leave the tape on for up to a week by reinforcing it with more tape as needed. Do not allow another puppy to pull or chew on the tape. When you remove the tape give the ears a few hours to adjust, then decide if they need to be retaped.

- Start the taping process at nine weeks if your puppy's ears are not standing up naturally by this time.
- It is best if one person holds the puppy while another tapes. It can be managed single-handedly if necessary, but you'll need lots of patience.
- Use 2-inch wide masking tape. No other size will do. 2-inch white fabric medical tape or duct tape can be used if the masking tape is not sticking to the ears.
- First use a band of tape to encircle each ear. (See illustration #1) Next put a long band of tape in front and in back to connect the ears. (See illustration #2) Add tape where needed to add strength to the construction.
- Make sure there are no folds in the ear when taping is completed.
- Distract the puppy until it becomes used to the tape.
 This usually takes 15 minutes or less. Use toys, food, or play as distractions. Be sure to tell them how good they are!
- Some puppies' ears will stand after the first taping.
 Others take longer. Retape if your puppy looks like the flying nun! (See Illustration #3)

New Puppy Care Handout

Your puppy now depends on you for everything – food, water, exercise, training, good health and hygiene. Please remember that all puppies are different, and you should consult your veterinarian and trainer for specific needs of your pup.

It is exciting to bring your new puppy home and into your life and heart. I know you will be excited to show him / her off and play with him / her right away but remember to give your puppy some time to adjust! We recommend three relaxed days at home. Your puppy is undergoing a lot of change and they need lots of rest while they adjust. Adding more stress during this transition is detrimental to both their mental and physical health. Puppies do not know English. The best way to train a dog is when they do a behavior you want, praise the pup with a pat, a treat or a verbal praise (keep it short and simple though). For example, don't say "Sit...sit...sit...sit...SIT" and expect a response. Get your puppy to do the behavior (sit) and then reward. You add the word and maybe even a hand signal later.

Puppy Chewing

Puppies have needle sharp teeth and this can be tough! Some tricks to help you avoid becoming a pincushion are to have chew bones and toys always close by! Do not ever let them chew on you. All it takes is one family member that allows this behavior and it will be possible for the toddler to become a chew toy too. Keep your rules and boundaries consistent. If your puppy chews on you, offer an acceptable item for them to chew on. If they persist, then take yourself away from them (put them in their crate or play pen, they are likely tired and need some sleep). Another tip that works for most puppies is to make a quick, sharp puppy "cry" noise. This is how they let other littermates know it hurts!

Jumping

Jumping is another problem that young puppies may struggle with. Their excitement and overwhelming love for people can make this extremely difficult; however, do not even start allowing this behavior. Do not reward, pet, or praise a puppy that jumps on you. Ignore them, turn your back, or walk away! A calm puppy that is sitting is a puppy that is ready for praise and love! Teach calm, self-controlled behaviors now; it will pay off as they get larger and stronger!

Potty Training

Depending on your bedtime schedule, remove food and water 2-3 hours before your bedtime to allow the puppy a greater chance of holding it all night. Remember that your

dog's bladder will not be fully developed until he or she reaches five months old Therefore, as your pup gets older, they will be able to hold it longer. If you do have to take your puppy out at night, please do not make this a play session. Be matter of fact (as little talking as possible) and get down to business. Praise the potty behavior and right back into the kennel. These puppies are very bright and if they know that you will get up in the middle of the night to play, talk sweet and love on them, they will start waking you for this attention alone. I strongly suggest crate training, and potty training is one of the biggest reasons why. Puppies will rarely potty where they sleep. When you bring your puppy home and put him or her into an appropriate sized crate (not too large, just enough room to turn around and lay down) they will fuss when they have to go potty! If you cannot watch your puppy or it is naptime, tuck them into their kennel. When your puppy has an accident, please just clean it up thoroughly and move on. Only clap hands and scold vocally **IF** you catch the pup going potty. Rubbing their nose in it, etc. is not acceptable and is a complete waste of time. In your pup's brain they are wondering why you are making them smell their own urine or feces. They know what it smells like! In general, your pup will need to potty every 30 minutes as well as after a nap, vigorous play, exiting the kennel and following meals. When in doubt, take out! Again, if you can't watch your puppy, in the crate they go! The puppy should not have the opportunity to have an accident, so if they do it is likely because you were at fault and did not see the signs that they needed to potty.

Crate Use

Dogs are den animals and actually prefer sleeping in small places. The cost of a crate may initially seem expensive, but when you compare it to the cost of ruined rugs and/or chewed up furniture, it is well worth it! When you bring your puppy home, it is best to begin using the crate right away. There are many different crates, but I prefer metal crates with double doors. I have a link to one on my website supplies page. 30 inches is a good size to buy and make sure it comes with a divider so you can make the crate smaller when they are puppies. The crate needs to be large enough for them to walk into, turn around and lay down. You should, however, refrain from giving your puppy a large crate in the beginning, because you don't want them to have enough space to have both a "sleep" and a "potty" area inside the crate. Also, in the beginning, do not put any blankets, beds or toys (other than maybe a chew toy) in the crate, these will just soak up any accidents and slow the crate training process. Once your puppy is reliably crate trained you can add these into the crate. Crate training can make potty training easier, gives you and your puppy a few breaks throughout the day and helps keep your puppy safe when you can't watch him or her!

Even though we expose puppies to crates early on, they are not used to staying in them very often with doors closed for extended amounts of time. Once you close the door,

protest may occur. This is where tough love comes into play – you will need to ignore the whimpering all the way up to the outright screaming (just make sure the pup does not need to potty or that something is wrong). If you let them out, you are teaching them that screaming will get them out! If you "console" them, you are teaching them that they are correct in their feelings of disdain. You cannot enable this behavior if you do not want it to persist into the future. Both behaviors from you will make this process very difficult. Try to get the pup to enter the crate on his or her own, by luring them with a special treat then close the door. Make sure you name the behavior as they walk in with the word, "Kennel" or something cleverer if you prefer. Generally, the crying and protesting only lasts 3 days - stick with it, it will pay off!

Socializing and Developmental Stages

It is imperative that your new dog socializes with other people and pets in a safe manner. Try to steer clear of other dogs and any areas populated by puppies and other dogs for a few weeks, until your veterinarian has administered all of your dog's vaccinations. Having your puppy around other people, dogs, new locations, in the car, etc. will create a much happier, well-socialized dog in the long run. You will be so proud to take your pup with you on the go, and he or she will enjoy meeting new people and visiting new places. However, you must be cautious of Parvo, a highly contagious and very dangerous virus that can live in any environment for years and can be easily tracked into your own house on your shoes. Do not keep your puppy sheltered during these precious developmental weeks, just make sure that you avoid areas with other dogs and that your pup keeps all four paws off the floor outside of the home. Brief and safe socializing is so important to the proper development of a puppy. I have 8 weeks of socialization. You have 8 weeks that are imperative to socialization. And it takes both of us to ensure a stable happy puppy follows! Please remember not all socialization requires face to face interaction. The most effective interaction is observation from a distance. Your puppy does not always need to be actively playing with a dog to be socialized to dogs. Passing dogs on a walk with no interaction is also good socialization.

Obedience/Training

Please start training your puppy immediately. They are smart, eager to learn and want to please! Dogs are pack animals and are looking to you for leadership and guidance when they join your pack. You will be amazed at how much they can learn starting at 8 weeks old. It is very exciting and rewarding when your pup learns something new! I highly recommend enrolling your puppy in Baxter and Bella Training Classes. Follow through with any "puppy homework" you are given to continue building your relationship with your pup and helping him or her learn through repetition. Start with sit, down, stay,

kennel, place and go potty. Also don't forget tether training! These exercises are very beneficial in teaching your pup self-control, focus and pack order.

Veterinarian Care

Vaccination records are enclosed in the puppy packet. However, your vet will advise you on what is best for the proper care of your pet. Please spay or neuter your pup at approximately 6-12 months old. The health benefits are overwhelming, not to mention the implications of an unplanned pregnancy can be devastating. It is in the contract that this must be completed in this time frame, and I must be sent documentation for proof.

Parasites

Unfortunately, parasites in pups are extremely common and it is estimated that 95% of pups have parasites. We do our very best to keep our puppies' parasite-free. They are dewormed at 2 weeks, 4 weeks, 6 weeks, and 8 weeks along with being given a coccidiostat at 5 weeks and 7 weeks. However, not all parasites respond to particular deworming and excess stress with "go-home" can "awaken" parasites that previously lay dormant. Throughout the eight weeks your puppy is with us, we perform random fecal tests to gauge any issues, and if any arise, we treat all the puppies in the litter. We may send your puppy home with the remainder of his or her medication if there is an issue. Nonetheless, it is much easier to stop repeated transmission when the whole litter is not together since they keep reinfecting each other! Upon bringing your puppy home, it is worthwhile for your pup to have another fecal test done at the veterinarian when you bring them in for their vaccinations.

Puppy "Massage"

10 Step Puppy Handling Exercise

*This approach is performed to improve your pup's ability to handle different types of touch, handling and sensation. It can be performed in ANY order. Do not put your puppy down if they are agitated or upset. If they are displaying resistance, stop until the puppy calms and then resume! Reward with positive praise and snuggles when done! *

- 1. Rub and gently tug on their ears
- 2. Cover their eyes for 3-5 seconds
- 3. Open their mouth, inspect their teeth and place your finger inside of their mouth. You can rub their tongue and gums. I also always look at teeth to ensure they are coming in correctly. Every once in a while, issues with tooth eruption do occur.
- 4. Rub their belly and chest in wide circular motion.
- 5. Run your hand up their back (from tail to head) a few times to ruffle their fur. Also practice "heavy petting" patting your pup's back like you are burping a baby
- 6. Gently massage their back legs
- 7. Rub your fingers in between all pads of their paws.
- 8. Tap on the tip of their nails
- 9. Put your hand on their collar and apply a slight tug or pressure
- 10. Touch their nose!

Doing this exercise will help your puppy know that being touched is relaxing. I use this to help my dogs settle down and lay there for any grooming needs, including brushing and nail trims. If you do not teach your puppy that being touched in these places is okay, they may become nervous about things like their feet being touched.

This is an excellent time to check the puppy over from head to foot each day ensuring everything is forming correctly and the pup's conformation looks and feels good. You can be standing (elevation work) or sitting - try both! Don't always perform the "puppy massage" in the same room at the same time. As pups age, it helps to do this exercise when they are sleepy - after a solid play session is a great time. It is also CRUCIAL to have others do the massage as well. You want your dog to be tolerant of touch by friends, strangers, kids, the elderly, veterinarians, groomers etc.
