- Huge data dump on data on student,s teachers, administrators, district-level finances
- Every october 1st-ish, state releases data, and is embargoes until around October 31st. Have about a week to look at this and decide what to present.
- % of youth who meet or exceed state standards is a key area of focus
 - o This is not the actual score, but is a proxy measure.
 - o Gets a lot of attention by parents, and media
 - It's predictable from year to year which schools are at the top
- Project was to bring context to these numbers, in the context of the October deadline.
 - Obvious measure was % of low-income students
- Relationship between poverty and % meets/exceeds:
 - Have % of youth qualifying for free/reduced-price lunch ("FRL") in the schools
 - Strong correlation between FRL and scores

- Scatter plots are very clear about the relationship, but most folks find it hard to digest scatter plots
- Exercise: compare schools with similar percentages of low-income schools
 - reportcards.dailyherald.com/lowincome/elem2014index.html
 - This was done overall, for high schools
 - Have a way to query district schools, sort by M/E, can see time trends in % poverty served, % minority, % M/E
 - Data is open-sourced
 - The project is clear about data that seems mistaken and missing
- After building these visuals, Tom and Melissa Silverberg (reporter at the Daily Herald) sought to partner with Linda Lutton. She agreed (but has been)
 - What does a reporter bring to this field? Curiosity + Skepticism
 - In November, WBEZ had reported that # of low-income youth now outnumber middle-income kids in IL public schools
 - No one wrote about it except for WBEZ!

Process

- Visualize the data
- Query the data with questions
- Scatterplot -- Linda found it convincing... was interested in the narrative of schools beating the odds (e.g. schools that are in the top right corner: high poverty, but also high achievement).
- Poverty/achievement index is a measure of "beating the odds"
 - Poverty-Achievement Index is determined by calculating the z-score of a school with respect to other schools in its income decile
 - (e.g. a school with 15% low income students will have its PAI calculated by finding its z-score in the population of schools with 10-20% low income students)
 - Precedent in education reporting and policy to focus on schools that "beat the odds." She hypothesized that if we have more of these schools, we should see relationship between poverty and school outcomes weaken. Lutton says that this scatterplot showed her that this relationship was not weakening, even with the increase of these "zero-tolerance schools"
- Interpreting beat-the-odds numbers:
 - Those below the average at a given level of poverty are overwhelmingly African American, those above are Hispanic
- Credit to Melissa Silverberg--was able to report stories from these schools
- There is going to be a Spanish-language version of these materials.
- Q&A
 - o Q: Did you look for correlation between per-pupil financing and school performance
 - A: low correlation between those. Also: specific to context, a certain amount of spending may be more or less consequential in different parts of the state.
 - Q: Is the relationship between poverty and achievement stable across years?
