

# Asian German Filmography (Long List)

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*This Asian-German filmography is a non-exhaustive register of titles directed by German-speaking filmmakers and are filmed in Asia or with Asian leads or themes, works by Asian filmmakers and are filmed in Germany or with German leads or themes, as well as films directed by Asian-German filmmakers with Migrationshintergrund. It also lists short films, including lost silent films, television documentaries, and webseries distributed on video sharing sites such as YouTube and Vimeo. More well-known, critically acclaimed, aesthetically innovative, or thematically interesting films are highlighted in bold and underlined. ## 25. Paul Wegener (director/actor) - he has made several films dealing with Jewish culture (Golem in particular), “barbarians” and animal stories

- *Der Rattenfänger von Hameln (The Pied Piper of Hamelin, 1918)*: A traveler comes into a town overrun with rats and vermin. He promises to free the place of the pests and names his price. When the townspeople refuse to pay him after he has done what he promised, he plays his tune again with consequences.
- *Lebende Buddhas (Living Buddhas, 1925)*: Two scientists get entangled in the theft of a Holy Tibetan document, a Sutra. As they rescue a Tibetan girl, one is apprehended and the other recovers the Sutra.
- *Der Weg nach Shanghai* (aka. *Zwischen Moskau und Shanghai, 1936*): Spanning the years between the Bolshevik Revolution and 1930, this Negri vehicle focuses on an

- ***Flüchtlinge / Au bout du monde (Refugees, co-directed with Henri Chomette, 1933)***: A French-German co-production depicting the plight of ethnic Germans, known as "Volga Germans," in the Soviet province of Manchuria. Essentially a propaganda film, it was mostly set in the Chinese city Harbin. A French version was released under the title *Au bout du monde* and released in 1934. Available on [YouTube](#).

The film was made by well-known director Zheng Xiaolong (*Empresses in the Palace, The Legend of Miyue*) and stars famous actors Jiang Wen, Hu Jun, Guan Xiaotong, Collin Chou, Sophie Marceau, and Vincent Perez from Switzerland
- *Port Arthur* (Nicolas Farkas, 1936)
- *Andere Welt (Another World*, Marc Allégret and Alfred Stöger, 1937): a married German woman becomes the lover of a Malaysian prince, performed by a white actor.
- *Mit versiegelter Order (Under Sealed Orders*, Karl Anton, 1938): In a Near East land, a German company building waterworks and mining copper is threatened by foreign interests. When the chief engineer is framed for a murder, the nephew of the ambassador makes a heroic sacrifice.

- ***Le drame de Shanghai* (The Shanghai Drama, G. W. Pabst, 1938)**: Made during G. W. Pabst's sojourn in France—with exteriors filmed in Hanoi and China—*The Shanghai Drama* is “the exile film to end all exile films, made on a Paris soundstage with a cast and crew of Austrians, Indochinese, and White Russians. This reverse *Casablanca* is the sort of minor masterpiece auteurs cherish, haunting confession in the guise of a despised genre work” (J. Hoberman). Louis Jouvet is the deliciously cynical Ivan, part of a Russian refugee spy ring in Shanghai. The plot revolves around a sad-eyed, sequined cabaret singer (Christiane Mardayne), who tries to extricate herself before the Sino-Japanese War begins.

## 7. Indian Woman Filmmaker Chetna Vora's Engagement with GDR Immigration History

- Biography: Born in Gujarat, India in 1958, Chetna Vora studied directing at the Hochschule für Film und Fernsehen Potsdam-Babelsberg from 1976 to 1982. *Oyoyo* was her graduation film. In 1983, she moved back to India together with her partner, filmmaker Lars Barthel, and their daughter Neelesha Barthel. Chetna Vora died in 1987.
- [Oyoyo](#) (1980): In this rare, singular profile, students from Chile, Guinea-Bissau, Mongolia, Cuba and Bulgaria talk about student life in the GDR, what informed their decision to study there and the challenges that came with it. The entire film is shot inside the hall of residence and offers intimate, candid conversations around love, aspirations and dreams of their future in an organic way between the director and her protagonists. Vora's incredibly precise camerawork and ability to capture the students' problems and desires within natural conversations gives the film a true insider perspective. These interview scenes alternate with music by Cuban Silvio Rodriguez, Brazilian Nara Leão and songs in Cape Verdean Creole. The original film copy is slightly longer, but unfortunately became damaged in parts over the last decades. The Film University Babelsberg Konrad Wolf provided a working copy and with the Film Heritage Funding Programme (FFE) will digitalise the original film copy.

Ihm sei „kein Dokumentarfilm der DDR bekannt, der Emanzipation so umfassend begriffen hat“, schrieb damals Ulrich Weiß in seinem Gutachten über den Film, bewertete ihn als „ausgezeichnet“ und setzte unter das zweiseitige Schriftstück den eigentümlich bewegten Satz: „Ich wünsche Chetna

Vora Glück.“ Sein Wunsch blieb unerfüllt. Die Schulleitung zog den Film während der letzten Schnittphase aus dem Verkehr, das Material wurde vermutlich vernichtet. Geblieben ist eine unter Aufsicht der Schule geschnittene Kurzfassung und eine heimlich auf Video abgefilmte Rohfassung, die gerade in dieser Form ein unschätzbare aufrichtiges Dokument ist und hier gezeigt wird.

Being a member of the national team is not only a way to make a living but gives the players prestige, popularity, and certain privileges, like larger food rations. To Ri Jong Hi, Ra Mi Ae, Jin Pyol Hi, and Ri Hyang Ok, however, the sport means more than fame or fortune. The camera follows the four protagonists during their active careers and after retirement, unobtrusively observing their everyday lives against the backdrop of bombastic monuments and solemn gestures in North Korea.
- *Ned, Tassot, Yossot* (넷, 다섯, 여섯, 2023): About five years after her film, *Hana, dul, sed...* (2009), Brigitte Weich returns to North Korea to ask four women on the national football team how their lives have evolved. After establishing the golden era in North Korean women's soccer, the four retired players watch Weich's film together and share their memories. They talk about various topics including their social standing as a female soccer player in North Korea, the expectations of their parents, appearance, and life after retiring. This film, which was only possible based on the trust and friendship Weich built with the players during her previous film. In a friendly and congenial cooperation between the filmmaker and her protagonists, a work arises that not only tells about the concrete life of a professional athlete in North Korea, but also poses the question of the images that we all make of ourselves to give meaning to our lives and the world. - *Bruderland ist abgebrannt* (*Brotherland Is Burned Out*, Angelika Nguyen, 1992), available through [Goethe on Demand](#):
  - Introductory text by Karina Griffith: In the shadow of the Covid-19 pandemic, Berlin Schönefeld quietly closed its doors forever, with a large part of its infrastructure becoming incorporated into the new Berlin Brandenburg Airport, which opened in October 2020. Angelika Nguyen's 1991 documentary film BRUDERLAND IST ABGEBRANNT portrays the airport, now already a relic, as a discourteous heterotopia, where Vietnamese workers are given a terse farewell as compensation for building the economy of the former East Berlin. More than just a document, the film is a testimony to the reprehensible treatment of Vietnamese guest workers. Having endured abuse, violent attacks, forced abortions and appalling living conditions, the workers were left without employment once the agreements signed by the reunified Socialist Republic of Vietnam and East Germany became null and void post-reunification. The film depicts life both inside and outside the worker dormitories, with the most persuasive scenes shot inside the airport. German bureaucracy is revealed to be sadly incompetent in performing a respectful valediction to the departing comrades.
  - Angelika Nguyen, born in 1961 in the former East Germany to German-Vietnamese parents, studied film and is an author, curator and film journalist. Her essay "Mutter, wie weit ist Vietnam?" (Mother, how far away is Vietnam?) about her childhood experiences of racism was published in 2011.
- *Sunday Menu* (Liesl Nguyen, 2011), available on [Vimeo](#)
- *Sorge 87* (Thanh Nguyen Phuong, 2018): available on [Vimeo](#).
  - [Introductory text by Can Sungu](#): In *SORGE 87*, Thanh Nguyen Phuong uses animated fabric prints to remember the contract workers who came to East Germany from Vietnam. Two couples, one Vietnamese, one German, look back at the time when they lived together in the small town of Werdau in Saxony. *Sorge* (which also means worry or sorrow in German) was the name of the neighborhood where the filmmaker lived with her parents as a child. In 1987, several new buildings were constructed there to house Vietnamese textile workers. For these newcomers, everyday life in East Germany played out between this residential district, the language school and the factory and was accompanied by cultural misunderstandings and difficulties in adapting from the outset. And yet this world also included a cinema showing Vietnamese films that were not dubbed into German. The filmmaker went on to create an interactive documentation project (which can be found at [sorge87.de](#)) with additional interviews, images and texts to accompany her autobiographically inspired short film.
  - Thanh Nguyen Phuong, born 1992 in Werdau, studied communication design and film and works as a freelance communication designer and filmmaker. *Sorge 87* screened and received awards at numerous international festivals.
- *Xanh* (Thi Dang An Tran, 2022, 12 min, available for streaming [here](#)): an animated short about a Vietnamese German daughter listening to her father's oral narrative of his flight and immigration to Germany.

- *Aus der Ferne (From a Distance*, Hoang Quynh Nguyen and Benjamin Hujawa, 2024, 17 min): traces German-born Anna's distant relationship with her father Hung and his country of birth, Vietnam. When she discovers, through a documentary, that he was affected by racially motivated attacks in Rostock in 1992, she suddenly finds herself confronted with Hung's culture and history.
- *Lonig & Havendel (Loney & Havender*, Claudia Scheffel, 2025): Um Schnee zu sehen und Deutsch zu lernen, zieht die junge Vietnamesin Trúc Lâm (Nano Nguyen) in einen kleinen Ort mitten im Erzgebirge in Sachsen. Sie ist fasziniert vom Wald, den Bergen, und der klaren Luft, die nach Wolken und Winter riecht und beim Einatmen in der Nase brennt - wofür sie von ihren Mitschülerinnen verspottet wird. Bei einem Ausflug in ein Bergwerk verirrt sie sich im Labyrinth der dunklen Schächte und kommt plötzlich auf der anderen Seite des Berges wieder heraus. Diese Welt gleicht der alten fast gänzlich - die Personen sind jedoch ausgetauscht. In der Stadt auf der anderen Seite lernt sie Duc (Tri An Bui) kennen, den Sohn einer vietnamesischen Familie, die einen Asia-Imbiss betreiben. Und während Duc versucht, die Balance zwischen seiner deutsch-vietnamesischen Herkunft zu finden und den Erwartungen anderer gerecht zu werden, nimmt Trúc Lâm die Hilfe eines Geistes an, um in ihre Welt zurückzufinden.

### 13. Films by Korean-German Filmmakers

- *Ise Kyopos – die 2. Generation der im Ausland lebenden Koreaner* (documentary, 30 min, Cerin Hong, 2004): Ise is derived from the Chinese numerical system and means 'second.' Koreans call other Koreans who live abroad Kyopos. Being Ise Kyopo means 'being different'!? Children of 1970s Korean immigrants describe their current lives in Germany—they find themselves in transit and this transition into German society is accompanied by a confrontation with the traditions and values of Korean society.
- *Suki* (short fiction, 15 min, Miriam Glaser, 2005): Suki ist deutsch-koreanischer Abstammung, jedoch kennt sie die Heimat ihrer Mutter nur von der Landkarte. Ihr bisheriges Leben stellt sich auf den Kopf, als sie erfährt, dass sie die letzte wahre Nachfahrin des koreanischen Königsgeschlechts ist. Eine Woche vor der geplanten Hochzeit, reist die 20-jährige heimlich nach Korea, um mehr über ihr zukünftiges Königreich zu erfahren.
- *Herr Kim und Schwester Lotusblüte (Mr. Kim and Sister Lotus*, Sou-Yen Kim und Miriam Rossius, 2014), available on [Vimeo](#)
- *Steh auf (Get Up/일어나*, Seung-Hyun Chong, 2015), [trailer](#) available on YouTube. Taeshik, a 26-year-old German-born boy of Korean descent, is torn between his Korean upbringing and his life in Germany.
- *Far from Abroad* (둥지를 떠나, Hugo Hyungguhn Yi 이형건, 24min, 2020): A young woman from Korea struggles to settle down in her new home in Germany due to her lacking language skills. When she befriends a Korean-German woman she sees a way to escape her helplessness and loneliness. But her new friend doesn't seem to be as helpful as she pretends to be.
- *Der Ohrwurm (The Earworm*, Aro Han, 16min, 2021): A young woman can't sleep. She lies on her bed and tries to read a crime novel. Half asleep, images appear before her inner eye in which dream, reality, memory and imagination intermingle. This raises the question of the effect of frightening images as reproduced by the media.

- *Im Winter 1963* (그 해 겨울, Su-Jin Song, 18min, 2023): *Im Winter 1963* erzählt die Geschichte Kn-Chull Kims, der durch das Anwerbeabkommen zwischen Südkorea und Deutschlands als Bergarbeiter nach Westdeutschland kam. Aufgrund der fehlenden Studiengebühr ist er gezwungen die Universität abzubrechen. Zudem muss er seine kranke Mutter finanziell unterstützen, deswegen setzt er sich in den ersten Flieger nach Deutschland, den die koreanische Regierung bereitgestellt hat, und landet in Düsseldorf. So begann er einst als Gastarbeiter seine Reise in Deutschland, wo er auch nach 60 Jahren noch lebt. Von den damals nach Deutschland entsandten 127 koreanischen Bergarbeitern haben nur um die 10 meiner Kollegen überlebt, erzählt Kim abgeklärt. Seine Message an die nächste Generation berührt das Zuschauerherz und regt zum Nachdenken an.

#### 14. Berlin-Based Iranian Filmmaker & Actress Hoda Taheri's Refugee Shorts Trilogy

- [\*Mother Prays All Day Long\*](#) (24min, 2022, winner of Special Mention at Locarno Film Festival): Confused between German bureaucracy and questions about sexuality, Hoda, an Iranian asylum seeker in Berlin, finds herself emotionally and sexually hooked on Magdalena, who promised to grant her asylum by marrying her. Due to changes in Magdalena's private life, the decision of marrying Hoda becomes more complex for her.
- [\*Als ob Mutter in der Nacht geweint hätte\*](#) (*As If Mother Cried That Night*, 2023, 19min): Es ist ihre einzige Chance, in Deutschland bleiben zu dürfen. Das wissen sie beide. Also entschließen sich Sirvan und Hoda, ein Paar aus dem Iran, dessen Asylantrag abgelehnt wurde, zu einem drastischen Schritt: Hoda muss ein Kind von einem Deutschen bekommen, dann wird beiden das Bleiberecht ermöglicht. Sirvan hat mit seinem Kollegen von der Arbeit bereits alles verabredet. Doch als der Abend kommt, an dem „es“ passiert, wird Sirvan und Hoda die ganze Tragweite ihrer Entscheidung voll bewusst. Und das, was sie verbinden sollte, könnte sie nun voneinander entfernen. Der Kurzspielfilm der an der DFFB studierenden Nachwuchsfilmemacherin Hoda Taheri schafft es, in nur knapp 20 Minuten mit nur wenigen Einstellungen, Sequenzen und Dialogpassagen eine unsagbare Dichte und Komplexität an Themen und Emotionen zu erschaffen. Der Konflikt der beiden Hauptfiguren wird allein durch ihre Haltung zueinander und ihre Blickkontakte deutlich. Wie verloren stehen Sirvan und Hoda isoliert in den Räumen, die als Orte der Kälte und Einsamkeit gezeigt werden. Ob das Treppenhaus im Asylwohnheim, der Besuch beim Amt, die reinigende Dusche nach dem Akt: Sirvan und Hoda sind gefangen in einer Situation, in die die bürokratische Ordnung in diesem Land sie erst hineingetrieben hat. Durch seine unaufgeregte und ruhige Erzählhaltung, das intensive Spiel der Hauptdarstellenden und die kluge Auswahl passender Motive ist AS IF MOTHER CRIED LAST NIGHT ein überaus eindrucksvoller Kurzfilm und ein Versprechen für weitere Arbeiten der Filmemacherin.
- [\*Mother Is a Natural Sinner\*](#) (co-directed with Boris Hadžija, 15min, 2024): Hoda, an Iranian refugee in Germany, lives with her boyfriend, Hadi. An unexpected pregnancy leads her to examine common beliefs regarding gender roles in a relationship and challenges the current social norms surrounding feminine bodies and motherhood.

- Two family histories, one century and two metropolises merge in one person: Weina Zhao, whose parents called her ‘Vienna’ – Wéiyěnnà – because they emigrated to Austria. Her journey into the history of China leads to the Cultural-Revolution, modern China and tackles the great issues of the 21st century: migration, identity and the search for one’s past.
- Weina Zhao lives in Vienna, her parents even named her after this city, but she has always been drawn to China and her family’s past, where the opposing realities of 20th century life came together. While her mother’s side were filmmakers in glamorous 1930s Shanghai, her father’s side were poor peasants in the North. The biographies of the two families are marked by China’s development, from Mao’s Long March to the tragedies of the Cultural Revolution, to its present. The film is a unique testimony to this part of the intellectual history of the 20th century.
- Weina’s journey begins as a timid approach to her family, but very soon she encounters traumatic memories – from the Japanese occupation to cruel imprisonment during the Cultural Revolution. She opens up unhealed wounds and has to face her own process of coming to terms with the past and her uprooted identity.
- ***Hao Are You*** (Dieu Hao Do, 2023, available on [MUBI](#)): The American War in Vietnam scattered them across three continents. Nearly 50 years after their escape, contact between the seven family members has all but broken down. How have traumas from persecution and violence inscribed themselves on the bodies and souls of the survivors and their children?

- [Der rote Punkt](#) (The Red Spot / 赤い点, Marie Miyayama, 2008): A young Japanese student discovers a box of old photographs that leads her on a journey to Germany where she learns about her childhood.
- *Outside the Sun Is Shining* (Masayo Kajimura, 2010), available on [Vimeo](#): the film documents the inside of the former Kurhaus (spa hotel) in Ahrenshoop at the Baltic sea in Northern Germany in spring 2008. Formerly a symbol of the GDR elite, the decayed building was pulled down in 2009, and is now replaced by a new building, a hollow glass construction of capitalism. The director focuses on the empty rooms of the ruin. They were filled with poetry, as if this in-between state of decay had stories and inhabitants of its own.
- *Mother’s Day* (Bin Chuen Choi, 2012)
- *Haus ohne Dach* (*House Without Roof*, Soleen Yusef, 2016): a Kurdish-German film co-produced with Iraq. Widely available for streaming on YouTube, Amazon.de, and Apple TV.
- ***Futur drei (No Hard Feelings, Faraz Shariat, 2020)***: widely available for streaming
- *Past Lives* (패스트 라이브즈, Celine Song, 2023): an American romantic drama film written and directed by Korean-Canadian director [Celine Song](#) in her feature directorial debut. The film stars Korean-American actress [Greta Lee](#) and Korean-German actor [Teo Yoo](#), who was born in Cologne. Yoo’s father was a miner, and his mother was a nurse; they both worked in Germany as *Gastarbeiter*. The film had its world premiere at the

Sundance Film Festival before going on to screen at the Berlinale in the Main Competition section.

- *Father* (Ariana Gansuh, 2023, 12 min): second-generation Mongolian German girl Mika helps her father clean Frankfurt's apartment buildings during the school vacations to be close to him. Since the death of his wife, her father has withdrawn. We experience two days in the life of a teen full of small, intimate moments of happiness, but also of confrontations with everyday racism.
- *My Therapist Said, I Am Full of Sadness* (Monica Vanesa Tedja, 2024, 22 min): a three-year process of undergoing therapy leads the filmmaker to ponder questions of acceptance and love. Archival material from their two families—their biological, devout Christian, Indonesian family, and their chosen queer kin in Berlin—hold some of the answers.

- *A Loving Family* (*Ai no ikka*/愛の一家, 1941): transcultural film adaptation of a classic German children's book in wartime Japan
- *Zigeunerweisen* (Japanese: ツィゴイネルワイゼン, Hepburn: *Tsigoineruwaizen*, from the German "Gypsy Airs"; Seijun Suzuki, 1980).
  - Based on Hyakken Uchida's novel, *Disk of Sarasate*. It takes its title from a gramophone recording of Pablo de Sarasate's violin composition, *Zigeunerweisen*, which features prominently in the story.
  - The film makes the first part of Suzuki's Taishō Roman Trilogy, followed by *Kagero-za* (1981) and *Yumeji* (1991), surrealistic psychological dramas and ghost stories linked by style, themes, and the Taishō period (1912-1926) setting. All three were produced by Genjiro Arato.
  - It won Honourable Mention at the 31st Berlin International Film Festival, was nominated for nine Japanese Academy Awards and won four, including best director and best film, and was voted the number one Japanese film of the 1980s by Japanese critics.
  - **Plot:** Vacationing in a small seaside village, Aochi, a professor of German, runs into Nakasago, a former colleague turned nomad. Nakasago is being pursued by an angry mob for allegedly seducing and killing a fisherman's wife. Police intervene, and Aochi vouches for his friend, preventing his arrest. The two catch up over dinner, where they are entertained by and become smitten with the mourning geisha Koine. Six months later, Aochi visits his friend and is shocked to find that he has settled down and is having a child with Sono, a woman who bears a remarkable resemblance to Koine. Nakasago plays him a recording of *Zigeunerweisen*, and they discuss inaudible mumbling on the record. Nakasago suddenly takes to the road again with Koine, leaving Sono to birth their child alone. Both men enter affairs with the other's wife. Sono later dies of the flu and is replaced by Koine as a surrogate mother. Nakasago takes to the road yet again. Aochi learns of Nakasago's death in a landslide. Koine visits Aochi and requests the return of the *Zigeunerweisen* record, but he is sure he never borrowed it.
- *Uindii* (Masato Harada, 1984): a German-Japanese coproduction, partially set in West Berlin; produced by Manfred Durniok
- *Maihime* (舞姫, Masahiro Shinoda, 1989): produced by Manfred Durniok
- *Spy Sorge* (スパイ・ゾルゲ, Masahiro Shinoda, 2003; produced by Manfred Durniok): This co-produced film presents the life of Richard Sorge, a German spy for the Main Intelligence Directorate (GRU) of the Soviet Army in Japan. Sorge and his contact Hotsumi Ozaki are arrested by the Tokubetsu Kōtō Keisatsu (Special Higher Police) in Tokyo, and Sorge recounts the main events in flashbacks.
- *Ode an die Freude* (*Ode to Joy* / *Baruto no Gakuen* / バルトの楽園, 2006, Masanobu Deme): “Deutsche Soldaten fühlen sich in einem japanischen Gefangenenlager wie zu Hause.” Based on the true story of the Bandō prisoner-of-war camp in World War I. It depicts the friendship of the German POWs with the director of the camp and local residents at the stage of Naruto, Tokushima Prefecture in Japan. The film, which explores the cultural interactions between the prisoners and the Japanese, starred Swiss actor Bruno Ganz and Ken Matsudaira.
