One of the central criticisms of the recent piece in *Hypatia* by Rebecca Tuvel, "In Defense of Transracialism," is that it failed to discuss much of the relevant literature by trans* and POC scholars. In the hopes of moving future work in the right direction, this is a collection of relevant resources that emphasizes work by POC, trans* people, and members of other underrepresented groups.
