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ABSTRACT (10 PT)

A well-prepared abstract enables the reader to quickly and accurately identify the document's basic content, determine its relevance to their interests, and decide whether to read the document in its entirety. The Abstract should be informative and self-explanatory, provide a clear statement of the problem, the proposed approach or solution, and highlight major findings and conclusions. The Abstract should be 100 to 200 words in length. The abstract should be written in the past tense. Standard nomenclature should be used, and abbreviations should be avoided. No literature should be cited. The keyword list allows adding keywords used by indexing and abstracting services, in addition to those already present in the title. Judicious use of keywords may make it easier for interested parties to locate our article (9 pt).

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1. INTRODUCTION (10 PT)

The main text format consists of a flat left-right column on A4 paper (quarto). The margins on the left and top are 2.5cm, and on the right and bottom are 2 cm. The manuscript is written in Microsoft Word, single-spaced, Times New Roman 10pt, and a maximum of 20 pages, which can be downloaded from the website: <https://ejournal.cvrkmg.com/index.php/ijevs>.

The title of an article should be the fewest possible words that accurately describe the content of the paper. Omit all waste words such as "*A study of ...*", "*Investigations of ...*", "*Implementation of ...*", "*Observations on ...*", "*Effect of....*", "*Analysis of ...*", "*Design of...*", etc. Indexing and abstracting services depend on the accuracy of the title, extracting from it keywords useful in cross-referencing and computer searching. An improperly titled paper may never reach the audience for which it was intended, so be specific.

The Introduction should provide a clear background, a clear statement of the problem, the relevant literature on the subject, the proposed approach or solution, and the new value of research, which is an innovation. It should be understandable to colleagues from a broad range of scientific disciplines. The organisation and citation of the bibliography follow APA 7th style, using (Zhang et al., 2025), (Veenendaal et al., 2021) and so on (Yam, 2022). The terms in foreign languages are written in italic (italic). The text should be divided into sections, each with a separate heading and numbered consecutively. The section/subsection headings should be typed on a separate line, e.g., **1. Introduction**. Authors are suggested to present their articles in the section structure: **Introduction - the comprehensive theoretical basis and/or the Proposed Method/Algorithm - Research Method - Results and Discussion – Conclusion**.

Literature review that has been done by the author used in the chapter "Introduction" to explain the difference of the manuscript with other papers, that it is innovative, it are used in the chapter "Research Method" to describe the steps of research, and used in the chapter "Results and Discussion" to support the analysis of the results (Lippe, 2020). If the manuscript was written with high originality, which proposed a new method or algorithm, an additional chapter after the "Introduction" chapter and before the "Research Method" chapter can be added to explain the theory and/or the proposed method/algorithm (Badu, 2020) briefly.

3. RESEARCH METHOD (10 PT)

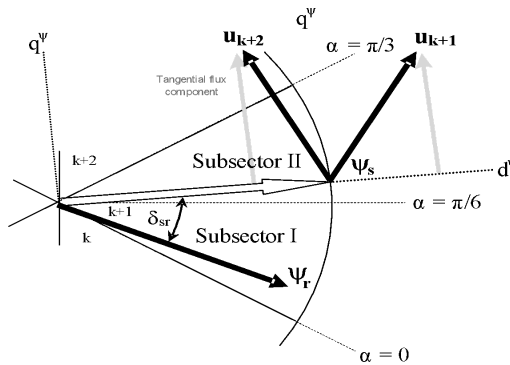


Figure 1. Effects of selecting different switching under dynamic conditions

Explaining research chronologically, including research design, research procedure (in the form of algorithms, pseudocode, or other), how to test, and data acquisition. The description of the research course should be supported by references to ensure that the explanation is scientifically acceptable. Tables and Figures are presented in the center, as shown in Table 1 and Figure 1 (must be bolded), and cited in the manuscript and should appear before it. Figures must use layouts *in line with text*.

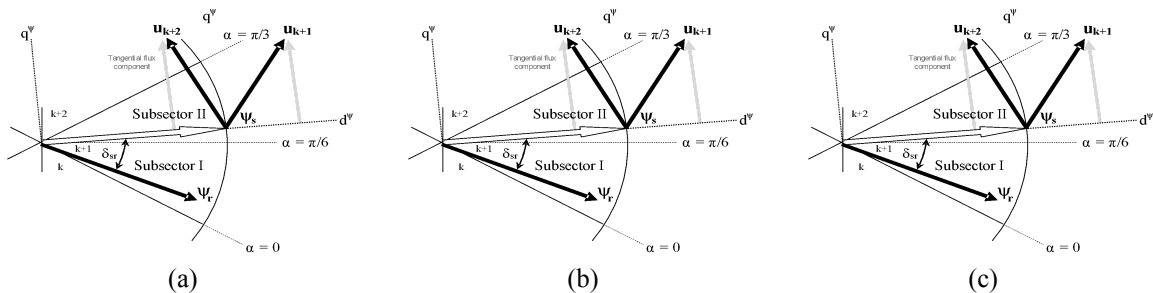


Figure 2. Effects of selecting different switching under dynamic conditions,

References are written in APA 7th Edition Style. Please use a consistent format for references – see examples below (10 pt):
