Please do not: Supply files that are optimised for screen use (e.g., GIF, BMP, PICT, WPG); the resolution is too low; Supply files that are too low in resolution; Submit graphics that are disproportionately large for the content.

#### 1. Introduction (12 Point Font)

State the objectives of the work and provide an adequate background, avoiding a detailed literature survey or a summary of the results.

# 2. Materials and Methods (12 Point Font)

This section should contain brief and descriptive information about the material and method used in the study.

### 3. Results and Discussion (12 Point font)

Results should be clear and concise. The most important features and trends in the results should be described but should not interpreted in detail.

### 4. Conclusion (12 Point font)

Please describe your most important finding and future prediction in your study in no more than three sentences.




Figure 1. Figure caption (10 point font)
