Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the LORD under Eli.

The word of the LORD was rare in those days;

visions were not widespread.

2 At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room;

³the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the LORD, where the ark of God was.

Then the LORD called,
'Samuel! Samuel!'
and he said,
'Here I am!'

⁵and ran to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.'

But he said, 'I did not call; lie down again.'

> He said, 'Here I am.'

if you hide anything from me of all that he told you.'

¹⁸So Samuel told him everything and hid nothing from him.

Then he said, 'It is the LORD; let him do what seems good to him.'

19 As Samuel grew up, the LORD was with him and let none of his words fall to the ground.

²⁰And all Israel from Dan to Beer-sheba knew that Samuel was a trustworthy prophet of the LORD.

²¹The Lord continued to appear at Shiloh, for the Lord revealed himself to Samuel at Shiloh by the word of the Lord.

Gospel John 1:43-51

43 The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He found Philip and said to him, 'Follow me.'

44Now Philip was from Bethsaida,
the city of Andrew and Peter.

⁴⁵Philip found Nathanael and said to him, 'We have found him about whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus son of Joseph from Nazareth.'

⁴⁶Nathanael said to him, 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?'

Philip said to him, 'Come and see.'

⁴⁷When Jesus saw Nathanael coming towards him, he said of him, 'Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit!'

⁴⁸Nathanael asked him, 'Where did you come to know me?'

Jesus answered, 'I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you.'

⁵¹And he said to him, 'Very truly, I tell you, you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man.'

Reading the Former Prophet This Week

Early in Samuel's transition from judges to priest/prophet/king Eli's old at Shiloh's shrine, sons Hophni and Phineas corrupt, Hannah's child Samuel still a boy, and Eli's ward He curses Eli's house, will anoint Saul (then David)

Blithely used in modern glib liberal circles as a model of 'call' religious experience of any person listening for God with them the tale will serve a purpose – but not likely the original one! In successions of 2024, who will be legitimated by whom?

Eli & Samuel may be the last 'judges' amid loose anarchy Samuel may be the first type of a biblical prophet to power Why is power legit: violence, charismatic personality? How do we navigate succession of power?

> Judges were one model of leadership, Part warrior, part inspired seer, Rising up in anarchy to call tribes together, And leading against external enemies

Samuel is neither judge, priest, warrior, nor king He's the archetype of a prophet Inspired by God to cut off Eli, anoint Saul (then David)

Neither old Eli nor child Samuel recognizes initial call 3-part tale reaches contact & transmission Then Samuel builds credibility over years What social locations do you recognize, ours and others?

Reading the Gospel This Week

John's version of the disciples call won't fit the synoptics:
Andrew is a disciple of John the Baptizer, (Jn 1:29-42)
Sent by John to check out Jesus,
in turn inviting his brother Simon to come
whom Jesus immediately renames Cephas here

'The next day' (v43 as v29) Jesus, leaving for Galilee, calls Philip and Nathanael, Bethsaida Gallilean boys – but down near Jordan and Jerusalem for this tale - Jesus finds Philip and says the classic 'follow me' But it's Philip who recruits Nathanael to 'come see' As Andrew did his brother Simon Peter

Nathanael is skeptical about Nazarene origins,
And Philip echoes the 'come and see' of the previous day story
Jesus wows him with recognizing him from under a fig tree
-a bit of cultural reasoning unfamiliar to us

Nate tries on a big label: 'King of Israel'
Jesus trumps it & promises more:
spitting skies, angels running messages to & from heaven

Can you disentangle these 'call' stories from the synoptic Jesus calling fishers from boats and come fresh to these first four, according to John?

Regardless of which tradition is factual, what truth does each tradition convey, about Jesus, John and disciples, in the origins of Jesus and church and about our own call or evangelism?

Bonus Epistle I Corinthians 6:12-20

12 'All things are lawful for me', but not all things are beneficial.

'All things are lawful for me', but I will not be dominated by anything.

¹³'Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food', and God will destroy both one and the other.

The body is meant not for fornication but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body.
