Presenter Bios

Judge Theresa Dellick

After earning a B.S. in Business Administration from Youngstown State University and a Juris Doctorate from the University of Toledo College Of Law, Theresa Dellick entered private practice in 1984. She became a partner in a Youngstown law firm and was a civil trial lawyer. In 1999, she became a county court judge, where she implemented the first misdemeanant county drug court. Since 2001, Judge Theresa Dellick has served as judge of the Mahoning County Juvenile Court overseeing the administration of the Court as well as the Justice Center, Intake Services, Probation, Clerk of Courts, Clinical Services, and Programming. Her administration of the Court has been directed to balanced and restorative justice with focused attention to youth accountability and responsibility, public safety, and restoration of victims' rights. Dellick, in partnership with the Mahoning County Mental Health and Recovery Board, created a trauma-informed community, Stand Grow Thrive, which continues to expand to include various businesses, law enforcement, social services, government agencies, schools, and churches. She is a frequent presenter at national and state conferences and is a member of several national and state task forces and commissions, including the American Psychiatrist Association Foundation and the CCJ. NCSC and COSCA's National Judicial Task Force to Examine State Court's Response to for Mental Health. She recently received the 2021 ATHENA Award from the Youngstown-Warren Regional Chamber. President Obama's Administration, the Department of Justice, and the U.S. Department of Education have recognized her efforts. She is also the recipient of the Champion of Hope Award from the Sandy Hook Foundation, Akron Children's Hospital Child Advocate Award, and the Silver Star Award from the Great Trail Boys Scout Council. She has received numerous other awards both local, statewide, and nationally.

Timothy Schaffner, M.Ed., Executive Director, Trumbull County Children Services

Timothy Schaffner was named Executive Director of Trumbull County Children Services in November 2012. As a leader in behavioral health and residential care for children, Schaffner has provided consultation and training for many educational, residential and child welfare facilities and brings a wealth of management and child mental health treatment experience to his role as executive director. Schaffner had been the executive director of Valley Counseling Services prior to joining Trumbull County Children Services (in April 2012), from 1995 to 2006 served as Corporate Director/Corporate Clinical Executive for the Center for Behavioral Medicine at Forum Health, and prior to that he was director of youth services at Tod Children's Hospital in Youngstown. Schaffner brings a total of 47 years of experience in professional child care to his position.

Nikunj Patel, LPCC/S, Chief Operating Officer, Cadence Care Network

Stephanie Edwards, LPCC/S, Clinical Operations Supervisor, Akron Children's Hospital

Stephanie Edwards, LPCC-S, is the clinical operations supervisor for the Psychiatric Intake Response Center (PIRC) and Parent Partners program at Akron Children's Hospital. She specializes in suicide awareness, complex trauma, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), diversity issues, chemical dependency, and issues stemming from abuse. Edwards is trained in Eye Movement Desensitization Reprocessing (EMDR) and is a Level II Certified Clinical Trauma Professional (CCTP). Edwards earned her master's degree in Community Mental Health Counseling from The University of Akron. She has been in the mental health field working with children, adolescents and adults for over a decade and has gained experience in a variety of settings, including intensive home-based treatment, residential facilities, schools, outpatient offices and the local crisis/suicide prevention hotline.

Monique Malmer, MSN, APRN, CNP, Akron Children's Hospital

Monique is licensed as a registered nurse and nurse practitioner in the state of Ohio. She graduated with a bachelor's degree in nursing from Ursuline College in 1993, later completing a master's degree. Monique completed her post master's certificate as a family nurse practitioner from Youngstown State University in 2014, after which she completed a Doctor of Nursing Practice program through Ohio University with a focus on sexual violence prevention. She has experience caring for all age groups including infants, toddlers, adolescent children, and adult populations during her 29 years as a registered nurse with eight of those years spent practicing as a nurse practitioner. During her career, Monique has evaluated over 3,500 children with concerns of sexual or physical abuse and neglect while employed at the Child Advocacy Center (CAC) for Akron Children's Hospital.

Jennifer Merritt, Superintendent, Mahoning Valley Community School

Jennifer Merritt is the superintendent of the Mahoning Valley Community School, a community learning center school in Youngstown, Ohio. She has provided leadership to the school for fourteen years. Prior to that, she worked for the Virginia Department of Education's Training and Technical Assistance Center at Radford University as a Project Coordinator where her work focused on self-advocacy and transition coordination for students with disabilities. She began her teaching career as a special education teacher with the Montgomery County Public Schools in Christiansburg, Virginia. Ms. Merritt holds a Master of Science in Special Education from Radford University in Virginia and is completing her doctoral project for a Psy.D. in Clinical Psychology with a concentration in trauma and youth violence research.
