# Let's Play Literacy Games

### **Zoo Animal Initial Sound Game**

### Materials

- Magnetic letters/foam letters or letters written on post it's or small paper squares (you will need z, m, h, e, g, r, l, t, b, s)
- These animal word cards OR make your own (draw an animal, write the words, but leave
  the first letter off. You can also just play this game on the computer and have your child look
  at the screen and find the letter to match each
  animal card.

### Directions

Have your child say the animal name. Have them say the first sound they hear when they say the animal name. Then have them find the letter that makes that sound. Talk about the name of the letter and the sound that letter makes!



### Count the letters in these zoo animal names

### Materials

• Print these zoo animal word cards OR make your own by writing animal names on paper

### Directions

- Have your child count how many letters are in each zoo animal's name and then write that number next to it.
- Talk about the names as you count. Which animal name is the shortest? Longest? Do any names have the same number of letters? Do any names start or end with the same letter?

# Syllable Jump

# **Materials**

- Painters tape or chalk
- This zoo animal word sheet (print or just read out loud without printing)

### Set Up

Make a number ladder on the ground with numbers 1-5. If you play inside you can use painters tape, or play outside and use chalk. See the picture for an example.

### Directions

Have your child stand behind the first line. Hold up a card and read it. Have your child jump one time for each syllable. Then have him/her look down and see what number he/she landed on. That's how many syllables in that word!



Try all the animals on the zoo animal list and then try some words of your own!

### **Shortest to Longest**

# **Materials**

 Any materials you can measure/compare by length (pencils, crayons, makers, sticks, leaves, or stick to the animal theme and use plastic zoo animals/stuffed animals)

### Directions

- 1. Gather your materials in a basket
- 2. Lay all your materials out in front of your child and ask him/her to put them in order from shortest to longest.

Line up objects shortest to longest, what do you notice?



### **Measure Your Foot**

### Materials

- Paper
- Marker or crayon
- 1 or more Nonstandard unit to measure (paper clips, q-tips, pennies)

# Set Up

- Trace your child's foot on a piece of paper
- Gather an item to use for measurement. It can be any item, but you should have several of whatever item you pick (20 pennies, 20 paper clips) and the items you pick should all be the same size.

### **Directions**

1. Have your child measure his/her foot using 1 or more nonstandard forms of measurement How many paper clips long is his/her foot?

How many pennies long?

Can you try measuring with a different item? Did it take the same number? More? Less?

# Make Giraffe print paper towels


### Materials

- crayons/markers/pencils


# **Directions**

# **Make Zoo Animal Trail Mix**

### <u>Ingredients</u>

- 1 cup of Teddy Grahams (any flavor)
- 1 cup of pretzels
- 1 cup of popcorn
- 1 cup of animal crackers
- 1 cup of iced animal crackers
- 1 cup of goldfish crackers
- 2 packages of M&Ms

### Directions

- 1. Mix all the ingredients together
- 2. Eat while going on a virtual visit to a zoo (see above for virtual zoo links)

# 5. Change it up!


- a. Choose an animal and an emotion have each player act out the animal with that emotion (e.g., sad cat, happy dog, etc...).

- 5. Step back and be amazed at your child's creativity!







# Make a Paper Plate Lion

# Materials

- Paper plate
- Paint (yellow, orange, black and brown)
- Fork
- scissors
- Optional- markers to draw a face on
- Optional- google eyes

# **Directions**

- 1. Paint the center of the paper yellow
- 2. Use a fork to add the orange paint around the edge of the circle for the lions main. Dip the tines of the fork in the paint and press on to the paper plate. Paint or draw a face. Add googly eyes if you have them.
- 3. Cut small snips around the edge of the paper to make his main more realistic and



practice fine motor skills.

## **Listen and Move**

Check out <u>Carnival of the Animals</u>, a famous piece of classical music by the composer Camille Saint-Saens. Move like the animal you think you hear in the songs!

WATER PLAY - Children love water play activities during hot weather, and many of them enhance gross motor skills. Have fun - Mrs. Bartha

- 1. Place a bunch of water balloons in a bucket across the yard. Have races to get the balloons (running, walking, walking backwards or sideways, hopping, galloping, frog jumping, jump sideways, walk on your heels, walk on your toes, walk like a penguin, etc)
- 2. Toss the balloons into a bucket or basketball net.
- 3. Play catch start super close together and pass the water balloon back and forth. After success take a small step backward and try to catch the balloon.
- 4. Target practice throw overhand or underhand at a tree
- 5. Have your child fill water buckets and carry them around, either to fill up a baby pool or help you water plants, to help with strengthening.
- 6. A water table is another fun way to incorporate many activities at once. In a water table, your child can float objects, pour water into cups and play with small squirt toys, all activities that strengthen his hands.
- 6. Take two buckets fill one with water and place them 10 feet apart. Use plastic cups to empty the first bucket and carry the water to the second bucket to fill.
- 7. Drip, drip drop (played like duck duck goose) fill a cup with water and walk around the circle sprinkling water on everyone's head, say drip. When you choose your target, pour the whole cup of water on their head. They run around the circle trying to chase you.
