

Welcome to your Family Empowerment Kit! The Parent Mentors at the Ohio School for the Deaf and the Ohio State School for the Blind understand some of the unique experiences you have had raising and educating a child with a diagnosed hearing loss, vision loss, or combined hearing and vision loss. Based on our past experiences, we have worked with partners at the Outreach Center for Deafness and Blindness, the Ohio Center for Deafblind Education, and a committee of family representatives to collate some of the resources we have found helpful in our parenting journey. Remember, you are an essential member of your child's team; we hope the information in this kit helps build the foundation of knowledge needed to better support your student.

Our goal was to create a "one-stop-shop" of information. A place where you can find essential disability-specific resources and information, record key events in your child's life, and your child's important educational and medical documents to share with your child's school support team. You will find three kinds of resources and information in the **Family Empowerment Kit (FEK)**:

We hope this **Family Empowerment Kit** gives you the information you need to develop your skills and knowledge to help enhance your child's learning. The binder is divided into two major sections: Resources & Information *and* Record-Keeping. **We have included an electronic table of contents with links** to carefully selected websites and documents and **copies of information and resources** that we believe may be relevant and helpful for your family and child's success.

The **Record-Keeping tab** is for you to organize and store important medical and educational information about your child. It is a way for you to have all their documents in one place. Everyone organizes information differently, so there is no right or wrong approach to how you organize your documents. Do what works best for you but keep all the information together. At your student's annual IEP (Individualized Education Program) meeting, you will want to share new information with your team and review old documents before the IEP. Ideas of materials to file and share may include audiograms, medical tests and assessment results, IEPs, progress reports, ETRs (Evaluation Team Reports), and more.

The **Electronic Resource** list included in this binder has links to some of our favorite organizations, agencies, and documents to help you learn and support your child and family. Conveniently, the links are available online. Please look for the **complete online resource listing coming later this fall**. Our goal is to keep this resource list updated in real-time and create an ever-improving, comprehensive list of supports for you and other Ohio families supporting students who are blind, visually impaired, deaf, hard of hearing, or deafblind. You may want to bookmark this location and check back often!

Several books have been provided to you that are engaging, easy to read, and educational. We encourage you to read the books at your own pace. Our goal is for you to know that these books are a wealth of easily accessible information - check back when you are in need, at an educational transition, or if you just have a question.

By law, states are required to educate students with disabilities (Martin, Martin, & Terman, 1996). IDEA provides financial support for state and local school districts.
- o What Is An IEP? (OCECD) This booklet explains that an IEP is an Individualized Education Program. When a child is identified with a disability under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) a child has a right to a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE). For a child to receive FAPE, an IEP must be developed for the child to progress in the general education curriculum.
