There are two ways to display the background; the first is to show the research context: why does the issue appear and what does the research gap that produce the problem. The writer may also provide novelty of the research by mapping out prior research. The research question may explicitly appear in this subsection, while the thesis argument must be clearly mentioned also in these paragraphs (1)

The introduction describes a brief background of the novelty, state of the arts, and objective (s). It should be written efficiently and supported by references. It should be written without numbers and/or pointers (1).

MATERIALS AND METHODS

The type of methods, time, sample, and research variable should be briefly mentioned in this part. For the experimental research that uses a laboratory, it must include the main ingredient with clear specification and source. The use of methods should be reproducible, and when taken from other sources, should be fully cited. The analysis of the data should be written briefly. State the register number of ethical clearance and the institution (2).

RESULTS AND DISCUSSIONS

The data are presented in an open table. Tables and images should be referred to in the text and given sufficient titles and captions so they are not dependent on the text. The table title is placed above the table, while the image title is placed at the bottom. The tables are numbered in order of appearance, as are the drawings. To facilitate editing, images/tables must be accompanied by a soft copy in Excel or JPG format.

1. References must number at least 20, with 80% sourced from recent journals (max 10 years) and 20% from older books.
2. The reference should use the number system (Vancouver style) I, recommend using the application of Mendeley.
3. The numbering of references must be appropriate to the article's appearance and written with Arabic numbers in brackets.

For example:

...data accuracy in this research could be matched with Riskesdas 2010 (1).

...in the step of this research, the studies in America also show...(2).

4. The journal title could be abbreviated according to the Medicus index. The list of abbreviations could be accessed on the library's website (<http://www.nlm.nih.gov>).
5. References from the abstract are not permitted.
6. Article references accepted by a magazine but have not been published would be marked "in press" or "forthcoming". The article was submitted to a magazine, but it is not certain whether it has been accepted, and it will be listed as "unpublished observations". These articles, if they are so important, could be used as references with the author's written permission.
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8. All literature should be verified by the authors of their own original documents.
