



Privacy notice for pupil

Under data protection law, 2018 individuals have a right to be informed about how the school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing 'privacy notices' (sometimes called 'fair processing notices') to individuals where we are processing their personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data.

We, Vernon Terrace Primary School, are the 'data controller' for the purposes of data protection law. For information please refer to our GDPR policy available on our website.

1. The categories of pupil information that we process include:

We hold some personal information about you to make sure we can help you learn and look after you at school. For the same reasons, we get information about you from some other places too – like other schools, the local council, medical professionals and the government.

This information includes:

- Your contact details
- Your test results
- Your attendance records
- Your characteristics, such as your ethnic background
- Any medical conditions you have or special educational needs (SEND)
- Details of any behaviour issues or exclusions
- Photographs
- CCTV images

2. Why we collect this information:

We use this data to help run the school, including to:

- Get in touch with you and your parents when we need to
- Check how you are doing in your exams and work out whether you or your teachers need any extra help
- Track how well the school as a whole is performing
- Look after your wellbeing

3. Collecting this information

While in most cases you, or your parents/carers, must provide the personal information we need to collect, there are some occasions when you can choose whether or not to provide the data.

We will always tell you if it is optional. If the data is compulsory to provide we will explain what might happen if you do choose not to provide it.

4. Storing this information

We will keep personal information about you while you are a pupil at our school. We may also keep it after you have left the school where we are required to by law.

We have a records management policy, which sets out how long we must keep information about pupils.

5. Who we share this information with

We will only collect and use your information when the law allows us to. Most often, we will use your information where:

- We need to comply with the law
- We need to use it to carry out a task in the public interest (in order to provide you with an education)

Sometimes, we may also use your personal information where:

- You, or your parents/carers have given us permission to use it in a certain way
- We need to protect your interests (or someone else's interest)

Where we have got permission to use your data, you or your parents/carers may withdraw this at any time. We will make this clear when we ask for permission, and explain how to go about withdrawing consent.

Some of the reasons listed above for collecting and using your information overlap, and there may be several grounds which mean we can use your data.

6. Why we use this information

We do not share personal information about you with anyone outside the school without permission from you or your parents/carers, unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Where it is legally required, or necessary for another reason allowed under data protection law, we may share personal information about you with:

- Our local authority – to meet our legal duties to share certain information with it, such as concerns about pupils' safety and exclusions
- The Department for Education (a government department) - to meet our legal obligations
- Your family and representatives
- Educators and examining bodies - to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for, to meet our legal duties to share certain information with it
- Our regulator (Ofsted who supervises us)
- Suppliers and service providers – so that they can provide the services we have contracted them for
- Financial organisations- to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Central and local government - to meet our legal duties to share certain information with it
- Our auditors - to meet our legal obligations, to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Survey and research organisations- to comply with our legal obligations under the Freedom of Information Act
- Health authorities - to meet our legal duties to share certain information with it
- Security organisations - to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Health and social welfare organisations - to meet our legal duties to share certain information with it, to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Professional advisers and consultants - to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Charities and voluntary organisations - to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for
- Police forces, courts, tribunals-to meet our legal duties to share certain information with it
- Professional bodies-to meet our legal duties to share certain information with it, to enable them to provide the service we have contracted them for

7. Data sharing

7.1 National Pupil Database

We are required to provide information about you to the Department for Education (a government department) as part of data collections such as the school census.

Some of this information is then stored in the [National Pupil Database](#), which is managed by the Department for Education and provides evidence on how schools are performing. This, in turn, supports research.

The database is held electronically so it can easily be turned into statistics. The information it holds is collected securely from schools, local authorities, exam boards and others.

The Department for Education may share information from the database with other organisations which promote children's education or wellbeing in England. These organisations must agree to strict terms and conditions about how they will use your data.

7.2 Transferring data internationally

Where we share data with an organisation that is based outside the European Economic Area, we will protect your data by following data protection law.

8. Your rights regarding personal data

You can find out if we hold any personal information about you, and how we use it, by making a '**subject access request**', as long as we judge that you can properly understand your rights and what they mean.

If we do hold information about you, we will:

- Give you a description of it
- Tell you why we are holding and using it, and how long we will keep it for
- Explain where we got it from, if not from you or your parents
- Tell you who it has been, or will be, shared with
- Let you know if we are using your data to make any automated decisions (decisions being taken by a computer or machine, rather than by a person)
- Give you a copy of the information You may also ask us to send your personal information to another organisation electronically in certain circumstances. If you want to make a request please contact our data protection officer.

Other rights

You have other rights over how your personal data is used and kept safe, including the right to:

- Say that you don't want it to be used if this would cause, or is causing, harm or distress
- Stop it being used to send you marketing materials GDPR Privacy Notice (Pupil), September 2022 Page 5
- Say that you don't want it used to make automated decisions (decisions made by a computer or machine, rather than by a person)
- Have it corrected, deleted or destroyed if it is wrong, or restrict our use of it
- Claim compensation if the data protection rules are broken and this harms you in some way

9. Complaints

We take any complaints about how we collect and use your personal data very seriously, so please let us know if you think we've done something wrong.
