## **Hillview Primary School And Hillview Early Years Early Help Offer**

Everyone needs help at some time in their lives and therefore an ethos of early help is important for any school. Within Gloucestershire, the Early Help Partnership is co-ordinated by Families First Plus but all organisations working with children and young people should view themselves as part of the Early Help Partnership. This is outlined in the table below.

We believe that early interventions for children or families, in many cases, will prevent children from experiencing harm. Hillview offers a number of early preventative measures. In particular we have Pastoral support available to work with children or families who are struggling with a range of difficulties or signpost them on to other appropriate agencies or organisations.

At Hillview, we use The Boxall Profile, which helps to indicate when support for children's Personal, Social and Emotional Development may be helpful. We are members of The Gloucestershire Healthy Living and Learning Partnership and Trailblazer program.

Expert and professional organisations are best placed to provide up-to-date guidance support and intervention on specific safeguarding issues as they arise. Hillview Primary School will refer to appropriate agencies when help is required to support children, young people or families or to prevent harm.

All staff must be aware of the offer of Early Help. At all times all staff should consider if there is any offer of early help that we can make in order to help a child thrive. Our aim is to help pupils and families as early as possible when issues arise: 'the right help at the right time to stop any issues getting worse'. Early help is an approach, not necessarily an action. It includes prevention education as well as intervention where necessary or appropriate. In some cases immediate urgent action might be necessary if a child or young person is at risk of immediate harm.

<p>Hillview's PHSE / SMSC curriculum</p>	<p>Hillview have combined PHSE (Personal Health Social Education), SRE (Sex and Relationships Education) and SMSC (Spiritual Moral Social and Cultural) Education. This is covered through the Jigsaw programme. In addition to this we use The Boxall Profile to support a more detailed look at a child's emotional well-being.</p> <p>This comprehensive curriculum covers many aspects of keeping young people safe, healthy, resilient and aware of the world around them so that they can make informed decisions. Where pupils have specific issues that need discussing or addressing, we will make their well-being curriculum bespoke to them. Other specific topics helping pupils stay safe covered within the curriculum include (age appropriate content):</p> <p><b>Sex education:</b> All year groups teach age-appropriate sex education through our Jigsaw curriculum. YR – Y2 begin each PHSE lesson with the NSPCC Pantasaurus film and song. Every 3 years, NSPCC visit the school to deliver 'Stay Safe – Speak Out' assemblies and workshops for all children.</p> <p><b>Drugs:</b> alcohol, smoking and illegal drugs.</p>

	<p><b>Keeping Safe:</b> E-safety (facebook and internet); personal safety (out and about); How to respond to an emergency.</p> <p><b>Emotional well-being:</b> Where to go for help if you, your friend or family member is struggling with emotional well-being/mental health problems? What are the signs someone is struggling? What makes you feel good; how to look after you own emotional well-being; personal strength and self-esteem; being happy!</p> <p><b>Relationships:</b> How to make and maintain friendship; family relationships; different types of families; SEAL</p> <p><b>Healthy Living:</b> Taking responsibility for managing your own health; importance of sleep; the main components of healthy living (diet, exercise and well-being);focus on breakfast; managing health and well-being when you are unwell (making sure you take your medicine when you should, have the right perspective, doing what you can do within the limitations of your health condition).</p> <p>Online Survey completed every 2 years</p>

Bullying (including cyber-bullying)/child death/suicide prevention	All Gloucestershire schools, including Hillview, are committed to tackling bullying. We want to know immediately if there any issues with bullying at school so that it can be addressed. Hillview Primary School can also offer support on anti-bullying for anyone who has suffered bullying to encourage behaviours that might avert it in the future (e.g. assertiveness) or to boost self-esteem. Children or young people with multiple needs (vulnerable) or multiple needs (complex) requiring multi-agency input or assessment.	Within Gloucestershire <b>Early Help Partnership</b> (co-ordinated by Families First) provide multi-agency support for children and families. A phone call to discuss a possible referral is helpful before making a written referral, (parents/carers must consent to a referral). Referrals go to the Early Help Partnership (representation from Education, health, social care etc. and referring agencies are encouraged to attend. All agencies should view themselves as part of this Early Help Partnership. Mental health concerns  * Please note that in Gloucestershire CYPS (children and young people's services) replaced	<p>Where there are concerns about a child's mental health, the Pastoral Lead will speak with the child, their parents/carers and class team, make observations and suggest class based intervention initially.</p> <p>Further intervention may follow from a member of the Pastoral Team in the form of a Boxall profile, group work or 1-1 support.</p> <p>Following this, a referral can be made to Young Minds Matter (Trailblazers) who will provide 1-1 specialist support, which may include the parent/carer.</p>

If a child or young person is suspected of living at home with a domestically abusive parent/carers or if a young person has domestic abuse in their own relationship then the usual procedures should be followed and a referral made to the Front Door (Children and family helpdesk tel: 01452 426565). The MARAC is an integral part of the Specialist Domestic Violence Court Programme, and information will be shared between the MARAC and the Courts, in high and very high risk cases, as part of the process of risk management.</p> <p><b>Gloucestershire Unborn Baby Protocol:</b>  Research indicates that young babies are particularly vulnerable to abuse but that work carried out in the antenatal period can help minimise harm if there is an early assessment, intervention and support. Working Together (2018) specifically identifies the need of the Unborn Child. Professionals should read and act upon the unborn baby protocol if there is suspected domestic violence and a pregnancy. FGM is illegal in the UK and as of October 2015 mandatory reporting commenced. (Close relatives are defined as; step-parents, siblings, brothers or sisters of parents or grandparents).</p>

See Appendix 2 for more information on radicalisation.</b></p> <p>Prevention: Hillview teaches traditional British values through the Well-being Curriculum: democracy, rule of law, respect for others, liberty, tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs and promotion of ‘Britishness’. E-safety is an important aspect of the curriculum to keep pupils safe from radicalisation. Pupils need to understand that radicalisation can be a form of grooming online and understand the notion of propaganda. They need to be taught to be discerning about what they read on the internet as the dangers of speaking to strangers online.</p> <p>Hillview also seeks to equip parents with the knowledge of how to safeguard their children from radicalisation. Let’s talk about it is an excellent website for parents <a href="http://www.ltai.info/">www.ltai.info/</a> While it remains very rare for school age children to become involved in extremist activity to the point of committing criminal acts, young people can be exposed to extremist influences or prejudiced views, including via the internet, from an early age. As with other forms of criminality or risk of harm, early intervention is always preferable. Schools, working with other local partners, families and communities, can help support pupils who may be vulnerable as part of wider safeguarding responsibilities.</p>

Also shared with parents/carers.</p> <p><i>Pupils informed that sexting is illegal but the police have stated that young people should be treated as victims in the first place and not usually face prosecution. The police's priority is those who profit from sexual images of young people....not the victims.</i></p>
Trafficking	<p>Serious crime which must be reported to Nigel Hatton (Gloucestershire LADO) and the Gloucestershire Police.</p> <p>Trafficking can include a young person being moved across the same street to a different address for the purpose of exploitation. Tel: 101 (Gloucestershire Police).</b></p> <p><b>GSCP Missing Children Protocol</b> <a href="https://www.gloucestershire.gov.uk/gscp/">https://www.gloucestershire.gov.uk/gscp/</a> : <i>Gloucestershire's protocol on partnership working when children and young people run away and go missing from home or care.</i></p> <p>ASTRA (Gloucestershire): The ASTRA (Alternative Solutions To Running Away) has the primary aim of reducing the incidence of persistent running away across Gloucestershire. The project provides support, advice and information to young people up to eighteen years old who have run away. This might be from a family home, foster home or from a residential unit. ASTRA provides support after the event to enable a young person to address the causes of running away. The ASTRA project offers young people help and the support required in order to find Alternative Solutions To Running Away. Freephone Telephone number: 0800-389-4992 EXCLUSIVELY for young people who have run away and have no money. All other callers are asked to use the 'ordinary' number (tel: 01452 541599).</p>
CME (Children missing education)	<p><b>Anyone concerned that a child is missing education (CME) can make a referral to the Education Entitlement and Inclusion team (EEI) at Gloucestershire County Council. Tel: 01452 426960/427360. Children Missing Education (CME)</b> refers to 'any child of compulsory school age who is <b>not</b> registered at any formally approved education activity e.g. school, alternative provision, elective home education, <b>and</b> has been out of education provision for at least 4 weeks'. <b>CME</b> also includes those children who are <b>missing</b> (family whereabouts unknown), and are usually children who are registered on a school roll / alternative provision. This might be a child who is not at their last known address <b>and either:</b> has not taken up an allocated school place as expected, or has 10 or more days of continuous absence from school without explanation, or left school suddenly and the destination is unknown. It is the responsibility of the Education Entitlement and Inclusion team, on behalf of the Local Authority (LA), to: collate information on all reported cases of CME of statutory school aged children in Gloucestershire maintained schools, academies, free schools, alternative provision academies and Alternative Provision Schools (APS). The EEI Team will also liaise with partner agencies and other LAs and schools across Britain to track pupils who may be missing education and ensure each child missing education is offered full time education within 2 weeks of the date the LA was informed.</p>

**Gloucestershire MAPPA (Multi-Agency Public Protection Arrangements)** are a set of arrangements to manage the risk posed by the most serious sexual and violent offenders (MAPPA-eligible offenders) under the provisions of sections 325 to 327B of the Criminal Justice Act 2003.
