Conclusion

This is the simplest full language ever constructed to my knowledge. It relies heavily on context to give its words meaning, and only has 6 words. This is based on Jack Eisenmann’s late ’00s* language [Facilish](#)^[OUT], which, although has exactly two words, relies heavily on punctuation and has no way of directly referring to objects or people.

*it is not made clear by any common source when Facilish was published, the above year was assumed based on the publishing date of Pegakibo, another language from the same publisher.
