Brief Description of Bill: Directs Department of Human Services to establish program to distribute funds to community-based organizations to provide financial assistance to **Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals** status recipients for specified purposes. Sunsets January 2, 2026. Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

Last year a similar bill was put forward to use funds from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 to provide Dreamers with up to \$695 to pay fees associated with DACA renewal. As most of that money has been spent, this year funding would come from the general fund.
